A BAD ASSESSOR.

A Tricky Tory Jailed and Fined—Honesty the Best Policy. The Chatham Banner gives a report of the trial of the Tory assessor of Camden, who tampered with the rolls in order to defeat Hon. D. Mills. The Tory assessor of Huron should take warning. Below is a synopsis of the case:—

QUEEN EX. CRAIG.

This was the case of the Camden assessor who was so anxious to defeat Mr. Mills that he set about manufacturing votes. He was charged with putting three persons on the roll in order to make them voters knowing that he was violating his duty. The evidence was conclusive, and in charging the jury the judge admonished severely on the grossness of the offence. The jury returned a verdict of guilty in all three charges, recommending him to the mercy of the Court. His Lordship scathingly commented on the prisoner's lack of principle and violation of duty. He could see no extension in the plea that he was ignorant of such an act was criminal. His own sense of right would tell him so, and he had the statute to guide him. If he did not wish to take the trouble to inform himself as to his duty he should not hold the office. His Lordship felt satisfied that he had been aware of his duty, but had taken a solemn oath to do it, and then had knowingly and wilfully violated it flagrantly. He referred to the shameful nature of the crime and the necessity for the enforcement of the law calculated to secure honesty in matters relating to the franchise, and said, had it not been for the recommendation of the jury he would have imposed the severest sentence. It was distinctly understood that he exercised the clemency he did in the present case solely on account of the recommendation of the jury. He then sentenced Craig to two weeks in jail, and imposed a fine of \$200. Craig to remain in jail until the fine is paid.
