RIZZIO murdered 1566. The Italian Secretary of Mary, Queen of Scots and an accomplished musician. Suspected of too great attachment to Mary, he was murdered by Darnley and his friends in the Queen's presence in the Palace of Holyrood. He was 26 years old.
COBBETT born 1762. A politician and controversialist who through the medium of his "Political Register," attacked both Radical and Tory in turn, and by merciless personalities frequently got himself into trouble. In 1832 he entered Parliament as member for Oldham, and by his trenchant speeches and writings always kept himself full in the public eye. His best known work is his "Advice to Young Men."

CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, To-day.
Frederick Townsend Martin, a wealthy New York social worker and author died to-day.

TORONTO, To-day.
Sir George Ross, Senator of the Dominion of Canada prior to 1905 and Premier of the Province of Ontario, died on Saturday morning.

KINGSTON, J.S., To-day.
An English expert after considerable prospecting, declares he has discovered a large deposit of radium bearing ore. Sample ore sent to the States has been pronounced satisfactory.

LONDON, To-day.
Sir Ernest Shackleton has now secured \$250,000 which is needed to carry out the exploring trip across the Antarctic continent. He wants \$50,000 more to have a margin for supporting the parties. The Government has given \$50,000 while persons have offered \$100,000 as a free gift. Another person offered \$175,000 for cinematograph rights, but the explorer said this remains to be decided. Shackleton is working 15 hours a day in preparations. He is obliged to postpone his intended trips to America and Norway owing to demands made upon him. He declines to discuss any further the Austrian explorer Koenig's claim of priority in exploring on Weddel Sea as a base, insisting he mentioned this intention soon after his last return from the Antarctic, whereas Koenig claims to have published his plan only last May. Whether the Austrian goes there or not, Shackleton says is a matter of indifference to him.

LONDON, To-day.
Militant suffragettes again engaged in a battle with the police yesterday in Trafalgar Square. The arrest of Sylvia Pankhurst for the sixth time under the Cat and Mouse Law precipitated the conflict. In addition to Miss Pankhurst, seven women and three men were arrested. Several hundred women and men had marched to the Square to attend a meeting of the Men's Federation for Women Suffrage. Sylvia Pankhurst, who for some weeks has been hiding from the police, arrived in the Square in a taxicab to deliver a speech, but the detectives surrounded the cab and started it for Holloway jail, before the militants realized what was happening. When it was discovered that Miss Pankhurst had been abducted, the chairwoman of the meeting, Miss Patterson, who later was among those arrested, shouted to her supporters from the base of Nelson Column to follow the flag and see if we can't find something to do. The militants then surged toward the Government building in Whitehall with the suffrage banner aloft, but a cordon of mounted police barred the way. Some women assailed the police with sticks but the marchers were soon dispersed.
