

ROGER BACON died 1294, aged 80.
He is generally alluded to as "Friar"
Bacon and was a man of remarkable
gifts. The invention of gunpowder
has been ascribed to him, also the
air-pump. For a long time he was
looked upon as an alchemist and sor-
cerer, and it is only in modern times
that his writings and scientific dis-
coveries have been rightly apprecia-
ted.

SIR JOHN FRANKLIN died 1847,
aged 61. The famous Arctic explorer
whose final expedition in command
of the "Erebus" and "Terror" ended
disastrously, all the members of the
expedition perishing. Many attempts
were made to discover Franklin and
eventually precious relics were found
to show that they had all perished
amid the rigours of the frozen sea.

Regarding the Bagdad Railway.

Big German Scheme Killed by War.

One of the big things the war has
brought to a standstill is a great in-
ternational railway of some fifteen
hundred miles in length.

The railway—the Bagdad Railway
is its title—was to have been finished
next year. Its object is to open up
Mesopotamia, to link Constantinople
with the Persian Gulf, and to pro-
vide a new overland route part of the
way between Europe and India. Ger-
many has knocked all this on the
head for the time being, and hurt
herself quite as much as anyone else
by doing so.

For Germany has a controlling fi-
nancial interest in the building of the
line; the bulk of the money so far
spent on the work has been German
money, and until the line is fully
open and paying, the money laid out
is, of course, earning no interest.
Which is distinctly annoying—for the
Germans.

Partly Under Turkish Control.

What the future of the railway will
be remains to be seen, but before the
war began part of it was open for
passenger traffic. The first part of
the system, under Turkish control, is
known as the "Ottoman Anatolian
Railway." The main line of this sys-
tem runs from the Bosphorus, out-
side of Constantinople, to the Persian
Gulf, a distance of four hundred and seventy
miles.

Here the Bagdad Railway proper
begins, and although fifty miles north
of Bagdad—the present extent of the
line—to the Persian Gulf is, as the
map will show you, a long march over
desert, the line, incomplete though it
is, must have been of immense service
to the Turks in their campaign
against us in one of our several "lit-
tle wars."

As soon as the Dardanelles are
forced, the Turks will lose their com-
mand of the railway, of course, but
until then it is theirs to move their
troops about.

The proposed line of railway south
of Bagdad skirts the Garden of Eden,
of all places. It runs by the ancient
plain of Babylon down to the Persian
Gulf, which, authorities have decided,
must have been the "river" with "four
heads" spoken of in the book of Gene-
sis.

Now "where the world began" is
within walking distance of a bit of the
greatest war the world has ever
known.—P. W.
