Funeral of Private Maxwell Reeves.

Large Number of People of St. John's Accompanied Remains To Railway Station-C. L. B. Band Played Dead 6

The funeral of the late Private Maxwell Reeves, of St. Lawrence, who died of meningitis last Friday morning at the General Hospital, took place yesterday afternoon from the residence of Mr. W. J. Clouston, Queen's Road, where the remains lay since the previous evening. Robed in the uniform of the Newfoundland Regiment the remains rested in a beautiful casket in the front room of Mr. louston's home. The casket was covered with a costly white velvet, the handles being of plated silver were exceptionally large, covering the casket was'a large Union Jack, while pinned on the breast of the deceased was a beautiful pink rose, the emblem of purity, a fitting tribute to the soul of the young soldier. At the head of the casket on a special table, rested a magnificent wreath of red flowers, in the form of a cross, presented by the Red Cross Workers of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, and on the top of the casket and arranged on special stands were some beautiful and costly wreaths kindly presented by the following: -Officers of the 2nd Newfoundland Regiment, members of A Co. 2nd Newfoundland Regiment, Women's Patriotic Association of Newfoundland, Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire, Mrs. W. J. Clouston, Mrs. W. H. Jones and Mr. Ernest Maunder. The cap, belt and side arms of the departed soldier also rested on the top of the casket and with a faint stream of light pouring through the Venetian blind the room wherein the dead soldier lay presented a most impressive

Shortly after 2 p.m. crowds started gather at the junction of Queen's Road and Garrison Hill, while another crowd equally as large assembled as the Parade Grounds and watched the manouvers of the different sections of manouvers of the different sections of volunteers prior to the commencing of the parade. Headed by the C. I. B. the parade. Headed by the C. L. B. Band the 2nd Newfoundland Regiment, 650 strong, proceeded from the Parade Crounds along Harvey Road, Military Road and Rawlins' Cross to Queen's Road the front rank halting opposite Mr. Clouston's house. The guard of honour with side arms, comrades of the same mess as the deceased, stood at attention and formed a square surhounding the hearse. By this time the swaying mass of humanity which had gathered from all parts of the city and nearby country places blocked the streets and filled to overflowing the vacant space in front of St. Patrick's Hall, The Rev. Mr. Brinton, Curate of the C. of E. Cathedral, who attended the deceased during his illness, was present and read the opening service for the burial of the dead, after which the pall-bearers, all volunteers under direction of Undertaker Carnell placed the casket on the hearse. As the remains were being brought through the door the officers stood at salute and with one quick motion the whole battalion came up to the attention whilst the great crowd of men, women and children looked silently on. The funeral parade, which was the largest of its kind ever seen in the history of St. John's, proceedied via Queen's Road, morning was chosen as the time for Water Street to the Railway Station.
