## Presentation Convent Association Elects Officers for 1920.

Before the meeting a letter was read from His Grace the Archbishop regretting the fact that he could not be present, and asking the Association to elect their officers, and asking those elected for office not to refuse, as he was anxious to have the Association keep together, not only until the present amount needed had been subscribed, but that he desired that the Association should not disperse at any time as the Sisters with an ever increasing number of pupils would always have many wants to be attended to. His Grace eulogized the work done last year under the President, Miss Furlong, the amount handed in for last year being over \$7000.00. This was beyond his highest expectations, and he heartily congratulated the Association on the years work. His Grace also mentioned in his letter that although the Sisters of the Presentation order were getting from the Government the same assistance as that given the Brothers teaching our boys, nevertheless the Brothers' Funds are greatly augmented by an annual collection, which in 1919 amounted to \$8,000, so that it is absolutely necessary for the welfare of our Catholic Girls that the Association continue the good work.

Last year's Committee consisting of Mesdames Redmond, Shortall, Beams, Fortune, Smyth, Donnelly and Miss O'Regan has been added to by the following names: Mesdames T. H. O'Neill, W. Lawlor, Oliphant and Payne; Misses Phelan, Clancy, Murphy and Bailey.

At the conclusion of the election a vote of thanks to the retiring President was proposed by Mrs. Emerson, and seconded by Miss Katie Duff, after which Miss Furlong thanked the members for their co-operation with her in all the work undertaken during her term of office, and wished them every success in the future. The President then addressed the meeting, and made arrangements for the annual St. Patrick's Day entertainment, which will be held, thanks to the courtesy of Rev. Bro. Ryan, in the Aulla, Maxwell, St. Bon's College. The entertainment will take the form of a sketch and concert, and by the advertisements later will be seen what is in store for those who attend. A dance is also in preparation for Easter, and many other attractions that will be announced in due time. The meeting then adjourned.—Com.

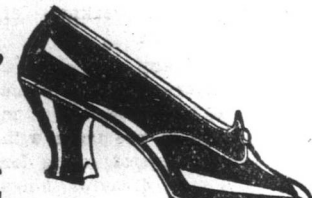
