Coals of Fire?

Judging by the kind remarks the Star has been making about us lately, that paper seems to have suffered a complete revision of its feeling in reference to our humble selves. We cannot, however, believe that kind remarks from the Star are kindly meant. In fact, we think that that little bit from Virgil "Timeo Danaos et dona ferentes" would be a very appropriate quotation in connection with the Star's complimentary remarks. To hear a paper which formerly could not heap sufficient abuse on us, now lavishing praise by the bucketful, is almost too unusual, too unbelievable, to be for one moment considered true. And yet, why should it not be true? If it is not possible that at this season of peace and goodwill the Star has repented and is now attempting to heap coals of fire on our head? We would like to believe it, but we fear that it would be such an unusual thing for the Star to do, that if we thought for a moment it was true we would bury our face in our editorial handkerchief and weep tears of joy until those on the floor below would imagine that the pipes had burst. No, we cannot believe in the Star's compliments, much as we would like to, for unfortunately the reputation of this journal is not one that is very likely to inspire confidence or belief in its editorial statements.

British Trade Enterprise

The second volume of British Foreign Bureaux, published by the Atlas Co., Exeter and London, has just been issued, and copies sent to the British Consuls and certain other officials, and to colonial and foreign buyers. The volume covers chemicals, dyestuffs and oils, and contains a preface by Sir John F. Brunner, Director of Brunner, Mond & Co., Ltd., the great chemical manufacturers, Northwich, Cheshire. Sir John Brunner writes on British Chemical Trade Opportunities, and reviews the present state of the manufacture of chemicals, etc., in the British Isles, with reference to its past, and to its prospects in the future. Admitting the lead that Germany has attained in this field, he points out that as a result of the war Germany is for the moment out of the running, while Britain, owing to the strenuous efforts after more proficiency in these industries, is far better able now to take care of a large portion of the world's trade in these industries, and should be able to hold its own, even after Germany gets upon its manufacturing feet again, as it is quite certain Germany will, sooner or later. Glancing through the pages of this work, the articles and advertisements contained in which are printed not only in English, but in French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Danish, Norwegian, Dutch and Russian, it is quite evident that British manufacturers are strongly reminded to make the most of present conditions and to cater as far as possible to the world's chemical trades. The list of heavy and fine chemicals, dyestuffs, and oils, to be had from the firm whose announcements are included herein, seems to be pretty nearly complete, and shows that those engaged in these manufactures in the old country are certainly waking up.

Recent Burglaries.

NO ARRESTS YET MADE.

It is now learned that the value of the goods stolen early Xmas morning from the store of Mr. W. H. Jackson, in the West End of the city, to be about three hundred dollars. To remove three iron bars before they could raise the window at the back. Once having entered they helped themselves to the best they could find, included in which were three suits, two raglans, several suits of underwear, and some articles of jewellery. The night marauders also looked at the cash register, but were disappointed in this direction as all the money had been placed in the safe. When Mr. Jackson examined the store he found the register, which was also entered from the rear, had goods to the value of \$200 taken from it. This is not the first time that this shop has been robbed during the present year. On Xmas morning the store of Mr. Fred Lukins, Hayward Avenue, was also entered and nine dollars was stolen from it. Attempts have also been made recently to enter private residences. Unless the perpetrators of these robberies are soon found many householders will undoubtedly have uneasy minds.

Inspector Newhook Honoured.

A deputation from the police force consisting of Constables Green, Myers, Walsh and Day called on Inspector Newhook of the City Constabulary at his residence on Field Street and presented him with a suitably engraved walking stick and an address in appreciation of his sterling qualities as a senior officer of the Force and of his courtesy to the men under his charge. The Inspector was taken by surprise, but in thanking the men, not for the intrinsic value of the gift, but for the kindly and generous spirit which prompted them to make the presentation, he regarded duty well done the highest tribute to the men of the Force of all ranks, and if he had been able to merit that appreciation from the citizens, he indeed felt very happy on this Xmas Day. After the presentation, Inspector and Mrs. Newhook entertained the visitors and a social and pleasant hour was spent.

I will visit England, Spain and Portugal, Italy and Greece." Mr. Coaker laughed aside the rumor that he would visit Egypt. "It is probably a joke on someone's part," he explained to the reporter. Mr. Coaker stated that his business would not be the selling of Union fish, but "general business." He will be absent about three months. Mr. Charlie Bryant accompanies him.

French Schooner Reported Lost.

The crew of the schr. Belle Franklin, which arrived in port yesterday evening from the northward, brings the story that while at Joe Batt's Arm it was reported that the French schr. Curieuse, which loaded codfish at Fogo for the Nfld. Labrador Export Co., had gone ashore at Fogo Head on Wednesday last. The Curieuse was bound across and was supposed to have left early last week, but owing to the telegraph lines being put out of commission during the recent storms no news of the vessel has been received. If the Belle Franklin's report is correct, the Curieuse would be the second foreign going vessel to be lost at Fogo within the past three weeks, the Danish schooner Harlett having driven ashore early in the month and became a total loss. So far as Mr. Long, a member of the Nfld. Labrador Export Co., is concerned, he has had no confirmation of the report. Up to press hour the French Consul, Hon. Tasker Cook, had likewise received no word of the vessel's loss.

Police Court.

The audience at the Court House this morning was unusually small. This was evidently due to the inclement weather, although it is rather extraordinary that even bad weather should keep away the habitués from their usual morning's amusement.

There were only two cases to occupy the Magistrate's attention. A youth was charged with larceny. He is rather a notorious character, having been but recently released from the Penitentiary after serving a term of twelve months. He pleaded guilty and was sent down for six months with hard labor.

A boy of seventeen was in for safe keeping. He had been released yesterday from the Penitentiary where he had been serving a term for larceny. Being afraid to go home, he applied at the Police Station for shelter for the night. His Honor ordered him to be detained until his father could be questioned as to whether he would give the boy another chance or not. If not, the Magistrate would have no other course open to him but to send the lad down for vagrancy.

Getting the Rink Ready.

The management of the Prince's Rink now have a staff of men at work busily engaged in preparing the rink for the coming season. Provided that there is a sufficient amount of frost to put the ice in condition during the next few days, we understand that the rink will open on New Year's Day.
