## DIAGONAL STREETS ARE RECOMMENDED

W. A McLean, Deputy Minister of Public Highways, gave an address on town planning and good roads to a convention at Hamilton recently. He referred to the fact that most muni cipalities are laid out on the rectangular principle, and advocated the building of diagonal streets through them to aid in solving the traffic problem. He also advocated the bonusing of the farming industry by municipalities co-operating in the matter of road improvements. In the United States, he said, many cities paid a large share of the cost of rural roads, and this was to the advantage of the cities. He said it was the duty of the cities and towns to look after returned soldiers, and they could do it by having them build roads.
