—In the Henshaw match at the D. R. A. rifle contest on Thursday, Sept. 2, Dillon, of the Seventh, made a score of 58, winning \$5. The match was won by the city team.

—A resident in the neighborhood of William and Hill streets complains of the bad conduct of some boys who make their evening haunts.

—Mr. W. Thompson, of this city, purchased the horse Gen. Jackson, which was in the 240 race at St. Thomas on Thursday, from Mr. A. G. Bedford, Chatham, for \$375.

The little lad who was handed over to the police yesterday afternoon as lost, was a son of Geo. Wyatt, who keeps a boot and shoe shop near the market and lives on Adelaide street.

Information was received by the police here yesterday that a top and harness awaited an owner at police headquarters in Sarnia. The horse is aged and 15 or 16 hands high.

—There were 3,200 tickets sold from this city for Port Stanley Thursday, according to the official count. This is the largest number of tickets sold from any one city for any one day.

—Among the many attractions during the fair week will be a concert given by the Falcon Company in the City Hall under the auspices of the Port Stanley Association. The concert will be a good evening's entertainment for patrons.

—Miss Millie Trimble, who has for some time held the position of cashier and bookkeeper at the Oak Hall, this city, has been transferred to the New Oak Hall, Windsor. Quite a number of her friends were at the depot yesterday to bid her adieu.

—C. B. Keenleyside, B. A., left for Hamilton today. He is a member of the department of natural science in the Wesleyan College, and teaches for a year or two before completing the B. D. course in one of the American Universities.

—Lieut. A. McLachlin, of No. 1 Company, Twenty-fourth Battalion, who has been in attendance at the Military College, London, for the past two weeks, has succeeded in passing his examination and has secured a second-class, grade A certificate.

—Lieut. McLachlin is captain of the Collegiate Institute cadets. [St. Thomas Journal.]

He was taken before Squire Smyth and remanded for a week.

—Mr. D. J. McFeggan, Dominion Express Company messenger between Toronto and Winnipeg, was yesterday afternoon united in marriage to Miss Lydia L. Youhill at the residence of the bride's parents, Wingham, Ont. Miss Elsie McFeggan, sister of the groom, acted as bridesmaid, and Mr. Woodman, also an express messenger between here and Toronto, assisted the groom. The Rev. Mr. Celery, pastor of the Wingham Methodist Church, performed the ceremony. The newly married couple go to Detroit and other American cities on a short honeymoon trip, after which they return to Toronto and take up their residence in Parkdale. [Winnipeg Free Press. Pigot.

The Hawthorne Fatality in Court.
Before Mr. Winchester in chambers at Toronto yesterday Mr. T. H. Purdon, of this city, on behalf of the widow of Conductor Hawthorne, of the Grand Trunk, recently killed in the St. Clair tunnel, raised some important points as to the ventilation and construction of the tunnel. The line of attack was disclosed in the course of some discussion with Mr. Douglas Armour, counsel for the defense. Hawthorne was suffocated in the tunnel through being in the rear portion of a train that had become uncoupled. The tunnel company is being sued because of alleged criminal negligence in the construction and maintenance of the tunnel.

Painters at work on the McCormick Company's manufactory were raising a horizontal ladder on which to stand yesterday. The ladder was raised up against the windows of the third flat the whole thing fell with a crash to the ground. Thomas Boon, who resides on Simcoe street, was pulling the rope from below. Death of Conductor Test.
Mr. Wm. Test, one of the best known and most popular of G. T. R. conductors, passed away last night at his residence, 79 Flora street. The deceased, who was in his 57th year, had been a resident of the city for over twenty years and was universally esteemed. For two years past he had been ill, suffering from an affection of the heart. He was out on Friday last, and appeared much better. For years he had been on the Air Line out of this city, and shortly before he was taken ill was removed to London. He was twice married. His second wife, a sister of Mr. Joseph Rogers, survives him. He leaves three children: Mrs. James Patton, of Niagara Falls; Mrs. W. Martin, of Chicago; and Mr. Wm. Test, of Port Huron. He was a member of Union Division, G. O. R. C. in which he was initiated. The funeral takes place on Sunday at 2:30 p.m. [St. Thomas Journal. Mr. Test had many friends in this city, where he resided several years. Latterly his home had been from London to Canfield Junction and return.]

Death of Mrs. A. S. Abbott.
The death of Mrs. A. S. Abbott, which occurred at 1:30 this morning, was not unexpected. For days she had been at the point of death. In her demise London loses one of its oldest residents, deceased having settled here in company with her husband—Assistant City Clerk Abbott—in 1812. On Oct. 28, 1816, she was born in Droghda, South Ireland, and was the daughter of Wm. Ruxton, royal engineer. On April 16, 1854, she was married to Mr. Abbott and nine years later they emigrated to Canada and settled in this city. Deceased had been a Methodist for 60 years and was an invaluable member of Queen's Avenue Methodist Church, where she labored in the good cause. Youngest Christians could not have

desired a better friend. They frequently sought her advice. Last spring she was thrown out of her carriage and since then has been unable to leave her residence to any extent.

Mr. Abbott and seven children survive her. The latter are: Mrs. J. G. Birely, Oshkosh, Wis.; E. W. H. G. and H. R. Abbott, city; W. R. Abbott, Decatur, Ill.; A. B. Abbott, Charleston, Ill.; and Mrs. D. E. widow of the late A. J. Tully, of Cincinnati, Ohio. A daughter died in 1875. At the time of the visit of Princess Louise to this city some years ago, Mrs. Abbott met with an accident, the effects of which were permanent and which proved a great shock to her nervous system. She was struck in the eye by a sky-scraper, and the optic was seriously injured. The Princess sent a sympathetic letter expressing her regret.
