Ross (J. & D. Ross), he describes his experience. Mr. Anderson says he is very thankful that he escaped from the wreck with such a slight injury—a cut on the right ear. He says that the lights he witnessed will never be forgotten. He was in the car in which there were so very many lives lost, and was thrown against the roof, afterwards climbing over the seats and breaking a window, through which he crawled. Mr. Anderson was about the first to escape, and turned to rescue the unfortunate people. Some were pulled out having both legs broken and others with slight injuries, while many were burned to death before his eyes, all help being cut off. Mr. Anderson lost all his clothes, even to his hat, but purchased new ones and continued on his journey.

The Governor-General's Drive.

No. 1 committee of the council, at a meeting yesterday arranged the route for the Governor-General's drive through the city to-morrow. Along the line a view of nearly every public institution and manufactory will be obtained, and at the Simcoe street school and Collegiate Institute songs will be sung by the pupils, who will be assembled in the large halls. The drive starts at 10 a.m., and the route as follows: Starting at Tecumseh street, the procession will proceed along Richmond street to Dundas; along Dundas street east to Adelaide; thence north to Queen's avenue; west along Queen's avenue to Waterloo street; up Waterloo street to Collegiate Institute; west on Dufferin avenue to Victoria Park and through the park to Richmond street; up Richmond to Albert and along Albert to Talbot street; down Talbot street to Dundas; Dundas to Ridout street and Ridout to York; west along York to Westbury, and by this thoroughfare to Bruce street; east on Bruce to Ridout and south on Ridout to Grande avenue; along Grande avenue to Wellington street bridge and up Wellington to Simcoe street school; from the school to Richmond street and up Richmond to the C. P. R. station, whence Lord and Lady Aberdeen embark for the east.
