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The Territory Uncle Sam Gets

By the Surrender Embraces 5,000 Square Miles.

Retrospect of the Two Weeks Siege of Santiago.

Heavy Losses Sustained by Both the Land Forces.

Remarkable Immunity of the U. S. Navy, While Spain's Fleet Was Annihilated.

Comments of the British Press on the Results of the Campaign-Reported Landing of U. S. Troops at Cienfuegos-"Porto Rico Next"-A Talk With Toral.

Washington, July 15.-The territory surrendered by General Toral makes about 5,000 square miles. The Spanish soldiers to be sent to Spain are estimated at about ten thousand men. Major Hopkins, the military aide to Secretary Alger, yesterday, had spread before him a huge map of Cuba showing the surrendered zone turned over to the American troops. The extreme length of this surrendered zone is 10 miles, and the extreme width about 50 miles, tapering to a less width, making in all about 5,000 square miles. It is a rugged, mountainous country, with very few towns of any size. Santiago, with its fine harbor, is the main point, while Guantanamo is second in importance.

THE COMMISSION.

Gen. Toral named Mr. Robert Mason, British vice-consul, Gen. Tolson and his own chief of staff, Gen. Shafter and Gen. Miles named Gen. Wheeler, Gen. Lawton and Capt. Milroy, of Gen. Shafter's staff. The news was received with enthusiasm in the American lines. The American warships are expected to pass under the guns of El Morro, and will command the town from the upper bay.

BRITISH NEWSPAPER COMMENTS.

London, July 15.-All of the London papers tender ample meed of praise for the success of American strategy in securing possession of Eastern Cuba with so little bloodshed. They recognize that further resistance on the part of Spain is hopeless, since, in all probability, famine will soon compel Gen. Blanco to surrender. Therefore, they say Spain ought to profit by the pause in hostilities to sue at once for peace.

The Morning Post editorially congratulates the United States upon the speedy success of the operations at Santiago resulting from the admirable manner in which the naval and military forces supplemented one another.

Spanish Losses.

U. S. TROOPS LANDED AT CIENFUEGOS.

London, July 15.-The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Mail says that 3,000 Americans have landed near Cienfuegos, and that the guns of the United States cruiser Montgomery, El Correo doubts the truth of this report. The government has no news on the subject.

PAYMENT OF SALARIES SUSPENDED.

According to a dispatch from Madrid to the Correspondencia Militar, the government has decided to suspend the payment of salaries to all civil military servants, as the money is needed for war expenses. Feverish preparations continue at the coast towns for the advent of the Americans. The governor of Ceuta complains of the unfitness of the guns and defenses there. All the guns that can be spared are being shipped to the Balearic Islands. Admiral Camara's squadron, it is said, will be sent to Cartagena.

TEXAS SPT.

London, July 15.-A dispatch to the Daily News from Gibraltar has a long story of a pseudo wealthy American who was lionized for six weeks at Madrid and Cadiz, where he dined with Admiral Camara, who inspected the fleet and defenses and in every way won the confidence of the officials, only to disappear the moment a warrant was issued for his arrest. He turned up afterwards in Tangier and confessed that he was not taken back to Spain in an official vessel unless there is an official pledge for the safety of the craft and their crews. Secretary Alger has no hesitation in saying that he doubted if Spain wanted the prisoners brought back there, and that if transported in American vessels without some agreement with the Spanish representatives Spain would not refrain from seizing them.

"NEXT IS PORTO RICO."

said Secretary Alger after receiving news of Santiago's formal surrender. "And then, if need be, Havana." The secretary said that the Porto Rican expedition will go forward immediately, it will comprise new men entirely.

THE SURRENDER.

Before Santiago, July 15.-After Santiago surrendered, a commission of two Spaniards, one Englishman and one American, was appointed to arrange terms. Our army will remain outside the city; but our sick will be taken in, and a general hospital headquarters will be immediately established. The truce was prolonged by a flag sent out from the Spanish lines at 10 in the morning. Gen. Toral's acting on Captain-General Blanco's instructions, asked time to communicate by cable with Madrid, the surrender of Santiago being too important a step to be taken without royal authority. In the meantime Gen. Gen. Blanco offered to appoint a commission to arrange terms. Gen. Miles and Shafter declined to call for a per-

The warriors in the trenches before Santiago have distinguished themselves, and it is not deemed prudent to bring them in unnecessary contact with new troops, in view of the danger of spreading contagion. The sick soldiers will be nursed back to health, and then brought to the United States as soon as they can be safely removed. Immense regulars will be ordered to Santiago to garrison the town, and, as stated before, two of these regiments are already under orders to proceed. The Porto Rican expedition will be commanded by Gen. Miles in person.

A TALK WITH TORAL.

Gen. Wheeler's headquarters, July 15.-Without saying so in words, Gen. Miles said the tenor of Gen. Toral's remarks all betrayed his realization that he could not hold out long. When Gen. Shafter explained that his reinforcements were coming up, that he was completely surrounded, and that new batteries were being posted, Gen. Toral simply shrugged his shoulders. "I am but a subordinate," said he, "and I obey my government. If it is necessary, we can die at our posts." During the course of an interview, Gen. Toral said the bombardment of Sunday and Monday had done little damage. He admitted the shells from the guns of the fleet had destroyed four houses, but he asserted that only half a dozen soldiers of the garrison had been injured. He also volunteered the information, when Gen. Miles gallantly inquired after Gen. Anares' condition, that the latter would probably be compelled to suffer the amputation of his left arm at the shoulder.

WASHINGTON, JULY 15.-Adjutant-Gen. Corbin last night received the following telegram from Hon. William J. Bryan: "Omaha, July 15.-Adjutant-general U. S. A., Washington, D. C.: I have the honor to report that I was mustered into the service today, and await orders. The command will be moved within a few days. I beg to testify to the efficiency of Lieut. Duff, mustering officer, and Lieut. Morgan, acting quartermaster. (Signed) Bryan, colonel Third Regiment of Nebraska Volunteers."

PORTO RICO HEALTHY.

The reported appearance of yellow fever is almost certain to result in the temporary removal of practically all our land forces from Cuba. The question of withholding for the present the expedition now being readied for Porto Rico has been under serious consideration, but up to this time no positive conclusion, it is thought, has been reached.

INVESTIGATION HAS CONVINCED THE OFFICIALS THAT THERE WOULD BE PRACTICALLY NO DANGER AT SAN JUAN TO OUR TROOPS.

San Juan, which is built on high ground, is said to be exceptionally clean for a Spanish town. The water is said to be good, and it is not believed that the present arrangements for the invasion of the island will be interfered with.

NONE OF THE TROOPS NOW IN FRONT OF SANTIAGO, IT IS UNDERSTOOD, WILL TAKE PART IN THIS EXPEDITION, BUT WILL BE BROUGHT NORTH TO REMAIN UNTIL OCTOBER, WHEN IT IS EXPECTED THE DANGER FROM THE CUBAN FEVER WILL HAVE PASSED.

INCENDIARY PROJECTILES.

Madrid, July 14.-The newspapers here publish a statement to the effect that the Spanish minister of marine has secured projectors for the use of incendiary projectiles, thus explaining the burning of the Spanish ships at Cavite and Santiago de Cuba. Some of the newspapers urge the government "not to protest to the powers on this subject, but to use the same weapons in Spanish ports against American ships."

AUSTIN'S STATEMENT.

A dispatch from Governor-General Austin, dated from Manila, says the insurgents are divided into two parties advocating independence or autonomy. He adds that a majority of the inhabitants of the Philippines are opposed to the American occupation of the islands, and he expresses the belief that by the concession of reforms the confidence of the natives can still be gained.

WHOLE UNITED STATES EXPEDITION EXPECTED THERE ON JULY 20.

London, July 15.-The special correspondent of the Times at Cavite writes under date of July 10: The American troops are a fine-looking body of men. "Out the discipline is easy, and not at all comparable to that of an English volunteer corps. Their clothing is heavy for a warm climate, and I fear the men will suffer from heat should field operations be necessary for the capture of Manila. There are about 160 cases in the hospital, chiefly of dysentery. A steamer arrived on the 10th.
