NEWS NOTES

C. E. Pillsbury, of Minneapolis, the
well known miller, is dead.

The North Waterloo election trial
will be resumed at Berlin on Thursday.

O. H. P. Belmont, of New York, has
taken a \$25,000 interest in the work of
the Democratic national committee.

The long-expected papal encyclical,
addressed to France, which has just
been issued from the Vatican, ignores
the Dreyfus case.

Brevet-Lieut.-Col. Burney, of the
Gordon Highlanders, has been appointed
professor in the Royal Military
College at Kingston.

An engine and 21 cars plunged
through a Missouri Pacific bridge near
Nebraska City, Neb., and were
perished in the burning wreckage.

Tired of domestic turmoil, Sir
Erne Phillips, of Scotia, Neb., forced
her one and two year old tots to swal-
low carbolic acid and then took a
poisonous dose. All three were dead
when Phillips came home.

The remains of Albert E. Nash, of
Chatham, were carried many miles,
wedged between freight cars, which ar-
rived at Toronto Junction, Sunday
morning. There had been a collision
between the cars and the remains were
seen what cars needed repairs.

THE VILLE MARIE BANK.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 16.—In the case
of the government against the officials
of the Ville Marie Bank, Mr. A. L.
Kent, one of the liquidators, swore
that while the return made by the
bank to the government on June 30
had given the amount of loans and
discounts as \$1,372,455, they really am-
ounted to only \$396,352. The balance
included \$926,214, made up of notes
signed by William Weir, president of
the bank, some of which were on be-
half of dead, insolvent and unknown
people, which Mr. Kent said would
not be regarded as current loans. Mr.
Kent could not see how Mr. Weir had
any authority to sign notes. A num-
ber of these notes were filed.

POINTS AT ISSUE.

Following is an authentic statement

Nine Pages of Talk
Protect Your Skin

Transvaal's Reply to Secretary
Chamberlain.

Said To Be of the Negative and
inconclusive Sort.

Cabinet May Meet on Wednes-
day and Decide on the
Next Step.

Summary of the Points at Issue Be-
tween the Two Parties—The
Boers Reply.

London, Sept. 18.—The reply of the
Transvaal Government to Mr. Cham-
berlain's note is said to cover nine
pages. It is eminently of the "nega-
tive and inconclusive" character
which Mr. Chamberlain declared would
compel the imperial government to
consider the situation afresh. It
practically ignores suzerainty, reverts
to the seven years' franchise, and de-
clines to give equality to the Dutch
and English languages in the volks-
raad. It is in short purely negative
and defiant. The full text may not
be available for a day or two, but it
will not change the aspect of affairs.
The cabinet will probably meet on
Wednesday or Thursday to consider
the next step.

BOERS MEAN TO FIGHT.

The Morning Post says: The Boers
mean to fight. That is the plain Eng-
lish of it.

The Standard says: The Transvaal
note is unsatisfactory, and, indeed, a
dangerous composition. It might be
going too far to say that the last hope
of peace had vanished, but it is idle to
deny that the rulers of the Transvaal
have brought their country very close
to the brink of a disaster, which the
British Government has done its best
to avert.

DUALISM DONE FOR.

The Daily Mail says: President
Kruger's defiance has terminated a
long period of unrest and uncertainty
in South Africa for whatever may be
the issue of the present situation, one
thing is certain—that dualism in South
Africa will end forever.

At Cape Town it is reported that
Mr. Hoffmeyer, the Orange Free State
leader, sent a telegram to President
Kruger to do all in his power to pre-
serve peace, but that he received an
answer in two words, "Too late."

All military men believe it is out of
the question to begin hostilities oper-
ations for two months, no rain having
fallen and the veldt being still bare.

THE REPLY.

The reply of the government of the
South African Republic to the latest
dispatch of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain
proceeds in part as follows:

"The government deeply regrets the
withdrawal, as the government under-
stands it, of the invitation contained
in the British dispatch of Aug. 23,
and the substitution in the place there-
of of an entirely new proposal, new
proposals, now fallen through, con-
tained in the Transvaal dispatches of
Aug. 19 and 21, were elicited from
this government by suggestions made
by the British diplomatic agent in
Pretoria, Mr. Conyngham Greene, the
Transvaal state secretary, Mr. F. W.
Reitz, suggestions which this
government acted upon in good faith,
and after specially ascertaining whe-
ther they would be likely to prove
acceptable to the British Government.
This government had by no means an
intention to raise again needlessly the
question of its political status, but
was, in the whole subject of endea-
voring by the aid of the local British
agent, to put an end to the strained
condition of affairs. This was done in
the shape of a proposal which to this
government seems to be so worded as to
satisfy her majesty's government. This
government saw a difficulty as to the
acceptance of these proposals by the
people of the Transvaal, and the
Transvaal, and also contemplated the
possible dangers connected therewith, but
risked making them on account of a
sincere desire to maintain peace, and
were assured by Mr. Chamberlain that
refusal of his proposals, but would be
settled on their merits.

"As regards the joint commission,
the Transvaal adheres to the accept-
ance of the invitation thereto given
by her majesty's government, and
cannot understand why such commis-
sion, which before was deemed neces-
sary to explain the complicated details
of the ten years' law, should be deem-
ed unnecessary, and why it should
now, without such inquiry, be thought
possible to declare this law inadec-
quate."

"Further, there must be a misappre-
hension, if it be assumed that this
government was prepared to lay pro-
posals for a five years' franchise and
representation of the new popula-
tion before the volksraad, and un-
conditional acceptance. As to the
unconditional acceptance, never made
any offer such as is referred to, con-
sidering, as it did, such a measure
both unnecessary and undesirable.

"The proposed conference, as dis-
tinct from the joint commission of in-
quiry, this government is likewise not
willing to enter upon, but the diffi-
culty is that an acceptance thereof
made dependent upon the accept-
ance, upon the side of the Transvaal,
upon precedent conditions, which this
government does not feel at liberty to
submit to the volksraad, and more-
over the subject to be discussed at
the conference remain undefined.

"The dispatch concludes by trusting
that the British Government, on re-
consideration, may not deem it fit to
make more onerous or new proposals,
but will adhere to Great Britain's
proposals for a joint commission of in-
quiry as previously explained by the
secretary of state for the colonies to
the imperial government."

POINTS AT ISSUE.

Following is an authentic statement

of the points at issue between Britain
and the Transvaal:

First—Great Britain claims suzer-
ainty over the Transvaal under the
terms of the convention in 1881. The
Boers dispute the claim, invoking the
convention of 1884, in which the term
"suzerainty" does not appear. The
Boers say the omission was delib-
erate; the British that the Queen's
suzerainty was understood, though not
specified, and
