Mr. Foster Resumes the Debate on the Budget-Sir Richard Cartwright in Reply.

Ottawa, March 27 .- In the house today, in the debate on budget, Hon. G. E. Foster spent five hours in a prolonged statistical criticism of all that the government had done. Hon. Mr. Fielding's exposition of the country's financial condition suited Mr. Foster so ill that he declared that even the clerks who had compiled the tabular extrements read compiled the tabular statements read by the finance minister were disingenuous. The increase of the British preference, the encouragement of the beet sugar industry by admitting the necessary plant free of duty, the ad-option of virtual free trade with Trin-idad, and the arrangement for listing Canadian securities in the catalogue of those in which in England trust funds may be invested, all failed to appeal to Mr. Foster's patriotic enthusiasm. No such plans had ever been originated by the Conservative Government, and therefore to the minute of Mr. Foster they seemed to be of no worth. He objected most strongly to the extension of the British prefer to the extension of the British pref-erence, and girded at the assertion that the government's policy has aided in the progress of the country. He asknowledged that the country is more prosperous than it was four years ago, but he denied that the fiscal policy of the administration had had anything to do in bringing this about. Canada's export trade with Great Britain, Mr. Foster allowed, had increased, but, he held, the Canadian government had had nothing to do with the increase in our sales to the British buyer.

It was after 10 o'clock when Sir Richard Cartwright, minister of trade

and commerce, arose to reply to Mr. Foster, amid a hurricane of applause. Mr. Foster's speech Sir Richard characterized as a magazine of misstate-ments, full of trickery and juggling with figures and suppression of facts The seven and a half million surplus Sir Richard pointed to as an unanswerable reply to the charge of extravagance. The conditions had so wholly changed between 1895 and the present time that it was desirable to keep up with the tide of prosperity and expansion. Sir Richard clearly showed that the "prosperity" under the Conservatives was meretricious. Sir Richard's thorough knowledge of finance was called in to show the house that the statements and com-parisons which Mr. Foster had made were useless as a means of comparing the expenditure of the two gov-ernments. Sir Richard took Mr. Foster's own figures, and showed amidst great applause that England buys \$11 per head per year from Canada, while from the United States she buys but \$4 per head. Much to the regret of the house and the galleries, Sir Richard moved the adjournment of the debate.
