First of all come three trees of noble beauty, the elm, the chestnut and the tulip tree, all of fairly rapid growth, and living to a great age. The former is the only one that has been used in street planting in Ontario, but the other two present great possibilities on account of the glossy beauty of their leaves, the flowers of the one and the nuts of the other. That the children would vote lived. for the chestnut admits of no question, but whether they might not become a nuisance when the autumn comes is a point open to grave consideration. It is seldom that one has an opportunity to see a specimen of either of these two trees which has been grown in favorable conditions. Nearly all have been more or less disfigured by the necessary struggle for existence which takes place in every forest. With the elm it is different, and many of these trees can be seen in the near-by country in a state of beauty which it would be difficult to surpass. The few names that are left are open to very serious objection. The silver-leaved maple is not sufficiently powerful to stand the wear and tear elements for many years, and in addition we have far too many of this The white and black ash, while handsome trees, are so slow in leafing out in the spring, and so quick to shed their foliage in the fall that their season is very short.

The horsechestnut has been severely condemned in Toronto. In fact, I believe a bylaw has been passed prohibiting the planting of this tree, mainly on account of the litter it causes in the streets.
