

Sydney, N. S., April 30.—A disastrous fire occurred this morning at Glace Bay, when four young children of Stephen Mc-Askill were burned to death.

The alarm was given by the nightwatchman of Dominion No. 3 colliery, who noticed the flames issuing from the roof of

the building. The family was in bed at the time.

The oldest boy, aged 13, who slept with his brothers and sisters on the second floor, while the father and mother slept downstairs, threw the youngest child out of the window, and became badly burned in his efforts to force his 15-year-old sister through the casement. Finding egress impossible, the girl rushed downstairs, through the flames, and was burned to a crisp. Three other children were so badly burned that they died almost instantly.
