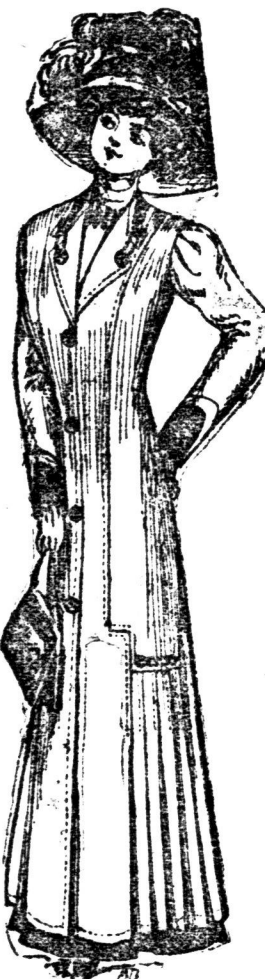

SEVEN VICTIMS

Miami, Fla., Oct. 20.—Communication with the outside world was established Thursday for the first time since last Sunday. While storm losses in Miami were not great, reports are coming in of extensive damage to shipping along the southeast coast of Florida. It is reported that there are 35 washouts on the east coast. Only seven deaths in all have been reported as the result of the storm, which is said to have been the worst in the history of the Florida coast. Scores are reported injured when their homes were demolished by the terrific wind and rain storm.

A CONSPIRACY TO SWAMP THE FRENCH

Those in Quebec Must Come to the Rescue of Those in Ontario.

AN AGITATED EDITORIAL

In L'Action Sociale, Replied to by Another in Le Soleil, Taking Opposite View.

Quebec, Oct. 20.—In a strong editorial published last night L'Action Sociale, regarded as the Catholic organ of the Diocese of Quebec, raises a cry of alarm, saying a conspiracy is at hand to drown the French-Canadians in the English element in this country.

"The assault we hear in this particular moment," says the paper, "is the worst we ever had to oppose, because it comes from those that have at once abandoned the line of battle where they fought at our side to mingle with the fanatics we have schooled, and we have the live enemies of our language and our faith. A large funeral procession, made up of the fighters' many friends, led by the French-Canadian element, followed the body to the cemetery.

The pallbearers were chosen from the Grand Rapids Lodge of Elks, of which Ketchell was a member.

\$1,300 RAISED TO AID SLAYER OF KETCHELL

D. P. Dickerson Believes Pugilist Was Victim of New York Plotters.

[Associated Press.] Springfield, Mo., Oct. 20.—A fund of \$1,300, to be used in the defense of Walter A. Dingley, who is in jail at Mansfield, Mo., charged with slaying Stanley Ketchell, a pugilist, has been raised by the slayer's relatives.

An unsigned letter received on Thursday from New York, said that the writer would be able to furnish some important information bearing on the case if desired.

The writer said that D. P. Dickerson, to whom the letter was addressed, would know who wrote the letter. Mr. Dickerson believes Ketchell was the victim of a plot. He says Ketchell had enemies in New York.

FUNERAL OF KETCHELL HELD AT GRAND RAPIDS

Large Procession Headed by Band and Flower Girls Follow Body to Cemetery.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Oct. 20.—The funeral of Stanley Ketchell was held in Belmont this afternoon, and a large funeral procession, made up of the fighters' many friends, led by the French-Canadian element, followed the body to the cemetery.

NOT FOR LAJOIE

Cleveland's Star Refuses to Play for Fletcher—Returns \$1,000 Check.

[Associated Press.] Cleveland, O., Oct. 21.—Napoleon Lajoie, second baseman of the Cleveland American League team, mailed a certified check for \$1,000, made out in his favor by S. A. Fletcher, of Cincinnati, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, with a request that Lajoie return the check to the proper parties. "I have prospered as a player in the American League, and have always been well treated by its officials," said Lajoie in a note accompanying the check. "I would not want to take part in the series against their wishes."

DEFEAT OF CUBS IS TOO MUCH FOR JURY

Chicago Judge Had Score by Innings Read—Court Adjourned.

[Associated Press.] Chicago, Oct. 20.—An extra territorial incident of the big game occurred in Judge Scanlan's court. The judge having secured the members of the jury were more interested in the game than in the case at bar, sought to right matters by having the score by innings read to them by a bailiff. This worked well until the defeat of the locals came in. Some of the jurors looked so melancholy that the court dismissed the panel for the day, explaining that in the circumstances it seemed impossible for the jury to spend enough attention on the game and its result to hear any more evidence.

south of this town. There are two men employed on the farm just now, Harvey Schweyer and Maynard Wilcox. Mr. Smelser rented the farm 22 years ago from Joseph W. Holmes of Selkirk, and has been a continuous tenant. Besides running the farm Smelser owned a threshing machine and a clover seed cleaning machine, which he hires out to neighboring farmers.

Unusual Occurrences. Unusual circumstances commenced to happen at the Smelser home about the middle of September. Belts, sleeves, and other parts were stolen from the seed-cleaning machine. Some of the missing parts were later found on the premises. Saturday, Sept. 24, found the machine ready for business again, and on Sunday evening it occurred to Mr. Smelser that as they were to begin using the cleaner on Monday morning it would be a wise move to watch it during the night. Lloyd Smelser was accordingly assigned for watch duty at the barn and thither he went armed with a shotgun. About dusk he returned to the house with a startling tale. He said he had shot twice at a man whom he had seen running away from the barn with two pulleys in his hands. The boy was positive he had felled the man with the second shot as the latter was rushing away through the cornfield in the direction of a woods, but on proceeding to the spot no trace was found of either the thief or the pulleys.

On Monday morning, Sept. 26, soon after 7 o'clock, Fred Smelser and one of his hired men, while working in the basement of the barn, smelled smoke, and rushing up found flames rising from the side of the haymow. The blaze had started several feet from the floor in the hay, and burst up so rapidly that nothing could be done towards extinguishing it. A wagonload of grain standing in the barn caught fire, and the men wheeled it out on the grass and upset it in order to save the wagon. Curiously enough, the missing pulleys dropped out of the load.

A Futile Inquiry. The fire was believed by the Smelsers from the first to have been of incendiary origin, and they asked for an investigation. The barn was valued at \$2,200, on which the owner,

PEAT FUEL PROVES SUCCESS AT OTTAWA

First Lot Manufactured By the Government Finds Ready Sale.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—The experiment made by the mines department during the past month of placing on the local market 500 tons of peat manufactured into domestic fuel at the Government experimental plant at Alfred, a few miles east of Ottawa, has proved a great success. The whole supply offered was sold within a few days at \$3.25 a ton, and since then there has been a deluge of orders for further supplies. There is a general consensus of opinion among those who have used the new fuel that it is cheaper and more satisfactory than coal. The results of the first year's operation of the Government plant at Alfred indicate that there is an immense field for commercial exploitation in developing the very large peat deposits scattered throughout central Canada.

SHOT HIMSELF

Toronto Man, Worried by Domestic Troubles, Suicides.

[G. N. W. Dispatch.] Toronto, Oct. 20.—H. F. Fell, a civil engineer in the employ of F. L. Somerville, the city's consulting engineer, shot himself in the lavatory on top story of a downtown office building this afternoon. He was addressed to the corner, stating that his suicide was caused by domestic troubles. The letter to Mrs. Richmond throws light on the tragedy, but the letter is regarded by the authorities as a sacred matter. Fell was about 51 years old.

Holmes, had \$800 insurance, and the crop at \$1,500, on which Smelser had \$700 insurance. County Crown Attorney John Murphy, of Cayuga, conducted the inquest, which resulted in nothing other than a complete exoneration of a farmer in the neighborhood, who was supposed to have been the man shot at by Lloyd Smelser.

Interest in the case was reawakened on Monday, Oct. 9, when a letter was found by Smelser on his veranda containing a warning that "another barn were erected by Holmes while Smelser was on his premises it would be burned. This letter was written with an indelible pencil in a round, legible hand. Another was found the next day, containing a threat that unless Fred Smelser abandoned the farm he would be killed. Both of these letters were stolen from the house and from Smelser's coat pocket, and the other two letters were in substance practically the same as the others. "I will have to carry out my instructions or be killed myself," it said. The last letter was found by Mrs. Smelser on Oct. 16, and was as follows:

"From You Know Who—I have received further instructions—namely, sell your threshing outfit; advertise it for three weeks in the advocate & you can sell it. Don't fail. Do it at once. Get out your bills I was bothering your son last night and your wife for a short time. Mailed at 3 p.m. Don't worry, for it is of no use. It pains me to do this, but I must. For F. J. E. Smelser."

The last three letters were judiciously printed on scribbling paper with a pencil.
