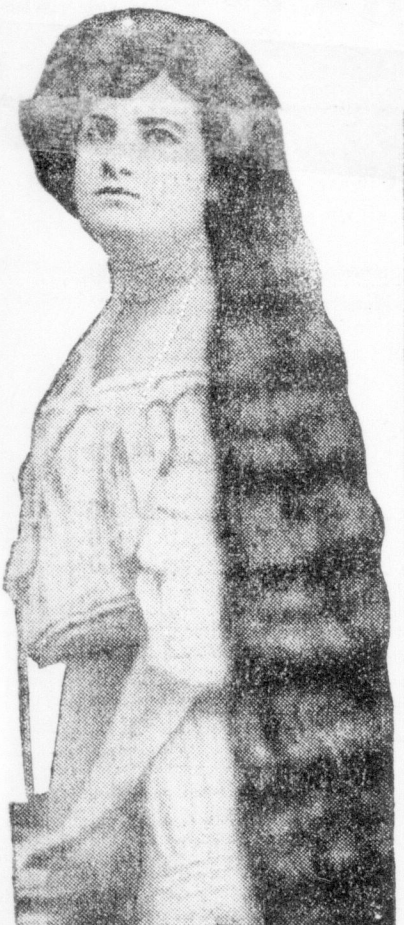

BUT NEWSPRINT
PRICES WENT UP

U. S. Commission So Declares
After Probe.

BIG JUMP IN IMPORTS

Canadian Paper Is Now One-
Third of That Used
Across Line.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—In a statement tonight announcing virtual completion of its investigation of newsprint paper prices, the federal trade commission declares that during the first half of this year, when prices already were soaring to unprecedented figures, the average cost of producing newsprint in domestic mills was less than \$1.65 per cwt., or below the average cost in the last three years.

The commission announced that before issuing its report public hearings will be conducted, and manufacturers, publishers and others interested given an opportunity to appear. No date is set for the hearings, but the report is said to be ready to send to the press in the near future.

Certain facts developed by the inquiry are made public now because most of the publishers' contracts for paper are about to expire. Contract prices rose this year from less than \$2 per cwt. to \$3 and \$3.50, and on current market purchases the publishers have paid \$7 or more for paper bought in the same way prior to January 1 for between \$2 and \$3.

"It is generally claimed in the trade," continues the report, "that costs in the future will increase particularly on account of the scarcity of labor in Canadian woods, and the consequent increase in labor cost of bringing logs to the mills. This is necessarily a matter of prediction concerning which the commission expresses no opinion.

"The quantity of newsprint paper imported, which came chiefly from Canada, equaled about one-third of the domestic production, and showed a great increase in the first half of 1916. The quantity exported also increased during this period, though the exports were small compared with imports. The prices, however, offered by foreign buyers were high.

"The stock of newsprint paper, which are very small in comparison with the production, not only declined during the first half of 1916, but also were lower than at any time during the year 1915."

\$40,000 FIRE IN

Dead.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Prince Mircea of Rumania, who has been suffering from typhoid fever, died Thursday, according to Reuters' Bucharest correspondent.

Prince Mircea was the youngest son of King Ferdinand. He was born at Bucharest, December 21, 1912.

SUBS RESPONSIBLE
FOR ANGHELIKI LOSS

ATHENS, Nov. 3.—Via London.—A communication issued by Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Entente Allied fleet in the Mediterranean, says that after an investigation it has been found that the Greek steamers Angheliki and Kiki Isaisas were sunk by submarines.

\$50,000,000 WAR LOAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Negotiations were completed today by a syndicate headed by the National City Company, which is controlled by the National City Bank interests, for a loan of \$50,000,000 to the Russian Government, the proceeds of which will be used principally for paying for war munitions. The loan will be a direct obligation to the Imperial Russian Government, and will bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent.

ARMED ESCORT WILL
CONVOY DEUTSCHLAND
ON HOMEWARD TRIP

U-57 Coming to America to
Protect Commercial Sub.

NEW LONDON, Nov. 3.—The German armored submarine U-57, a sister ship of the U-53, which recently sunk five vessels off the New England coast, is expected to act as a convoy for the undersea freighter Deutschland on her return trip to Germany, according to a statement tonight by Capt. Paul Koenig.

The Deutschland's skipper added: "I would not be surprised if the armored submarine appeared off this coast while I am in port. You can't tell what the Government will do."

In answer to questions Capt. Koenig said he probably would make his homeward dash within the next ten days. He denied a report that he would go through the Cape Cod Canal, saying nothing was to be gained by this route.

Calling Up All
Eligible Men of
Belgian Nativity

Those in Canada Between 18
and 40 Summoned to
Colors.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—By virtue of the decree of King Albert, dated the 21st of July last, and calling to the service of their country all able-bodied Belgians, aged from 18 to 40, all such Belgians living in the Dominion of Canada are being summoned to register with their consuls before the first of December next.

The Consul-General of Belgium at Ottawa, is issuing instructions to that effect, and those who enlist with the Canadian overseas forces before the first of December will be exempted from registration.

Brilliant French
Soldier Succumbs

Leader of Attack on Douaumont Dies
of His Wounds.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—Gen. Anselin, commander of the brigade which led the assault on Fort Douaumont in the Verdun region on October 24, has died of wounds. Gen. Nivelle, the commander at Verdun, in announcing the death to Mrs. Anselin, alluded to the fact that her husband had prepared for the victory and capture of Douaumont.

Gen. Anselin was a brilliant officer, and had served as first assistant to three ministers of war, Berthelet, Blumie and Millerand, in the direction of the army administration.

BONDED WAREHOUSES
NO LONGER ALLOWED

Ottawa Refuses to Grant Further
Licenses in Ontario.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—The Ottawa bonded warehouses refusing to issue bonded warehouses licenses in Ontario during the period that the Ontario temperance act is in force.

Applicants for such licenses have received replies from the department of inland revenue announcing the government's decision in the matter. The action of the Ottawa Government settles a debatable point, and disappoints a dozen or more of former shop licensees who had made application to Ottawa to do business from a bonded warehouse.

There are at present about twenty bonded warehouses in Ontario, which received their licenses before the Ontario temperance act was passed. These will apparently be allowed to continue their business until the end of the federal license year.

Entente Allies
Honor Victim
of Hun Subs

Diplomats and Naval Officers
Attend Funeral of Anghe-
liki Volunteer.

PIRAEUS, Wednesday, Nov. 1, via London, Nov. 3.—(Delayed).—Four thousand workmen today followed to the cemetery the body of one of the men who perished when the Greek steamer Angheliki with 30 recruits for the Greek volunteer movement on board, was sunk recently near Piraeus by a German submarine.

The funeral was held by the labor unions from the harbor centre during the afternoon. The Entente allied diplomatic corps sent a wreath for the casket, and the French Admiral Du Fournet and the allied military attaches attended the service in full uniform. Detachments of French and British sailors and officers wearing mourning bands on their arms represented the allied fleet. The warships in the harbor half-masted their flags during the funeral. The arrangements for the ceremony were supervised by the French naval and secret police officers.

A Zionist demonstration which had been expected, did not take place, and no disorder marked the funeral. The families of other victims of the disaster held private funerals during the day for their dead.

The aviator is now on his way to England.
