This is of paramount importance ecause the understanding is so widespread among golfers that the wrist should be under the shaft when the top of the back swing is reached. Nine ordinary golfers in any ten are convinced, somehow, that the left



wrist must be under the shaft. Ten expert golfers out of any ten you could name offhand would, in each case, have the left wrist positioned otherwise. This wrist does not go under the shaft at that point. On the contrary the wrist is in a direct life between the shaft, your arm and the ball. 
### PINAFORE PARK SOLD **OUT FOR SECOND GAME**
