## LYON REINQUISHES SENIOR GOLF TITLE

Failure To Sink Long Putt Gives F. A. Parker Championship.

Toronto, Sept. 5.—After holding the championship for six years, since the formation of the association, George S. Lyon of the Lambton Club, relinquished the title in the seventh annual tournament of the Canadian Seniors' Golf Association, to his clubmate, F. A. Parker, but it was not until both men had staged a great struggle for the honors that the veteran was forced to acknowledge defeat. In the thirty-six holes, played on Wednesday and Thursday, the two were tied for first place with cards of 162, and in the eighteen-hole play-off on Thursday afternoon, Mr. Lyon sank a twelve-foot putt to square the score at 79, and the two were forced to play off again this afternoon, and once again the former champion faced with the task of sinking a long putt, a twenty-five footer, to square the match, but he was short and the title changed hands amidst a deep silence. No one wanted to applaud the winner, much as they appreciated his good game and his fighting qualities, because they sympathized with the loser, who had made a game struggle to retain his laurels.

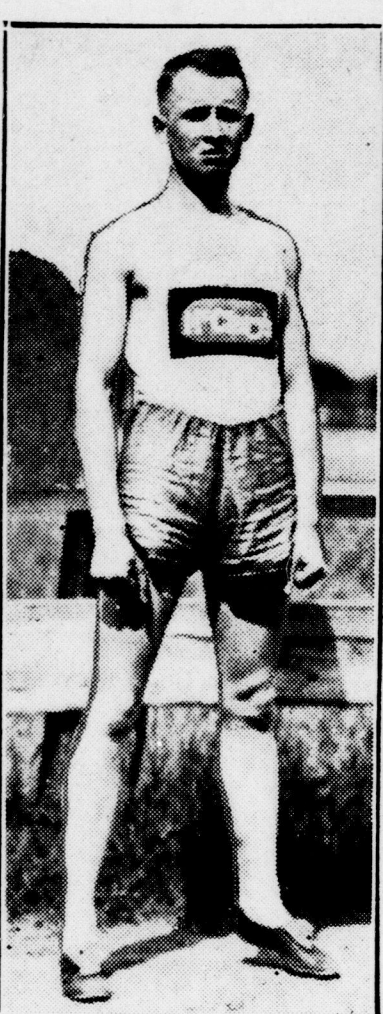
**Officers Re-Elected.**

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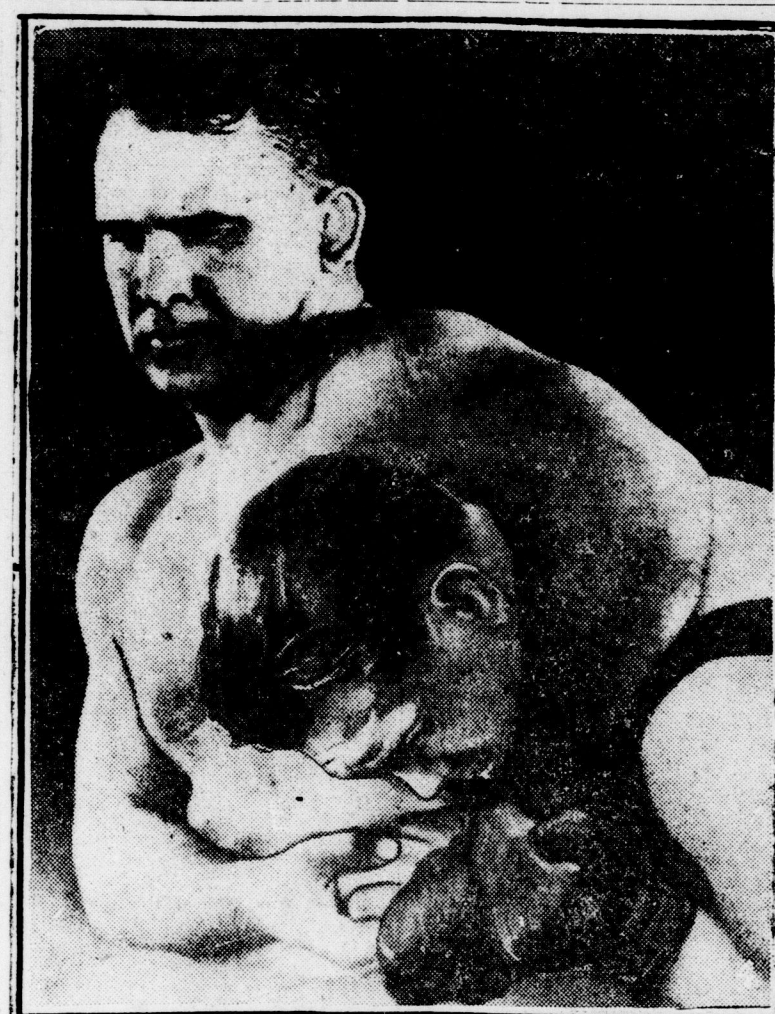
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SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDS TITLE.
