LECTURER EXCHANGE PROVES A SUCCESS

New Western-O. A. C. Plan Gives Students Different Points of View.

During the present academic year the department of economics in the university of Western Ontario and the Ontario agricultural college have decided to exchange lecturers for short periods, so that the students in their respective classes would get different points of view. Professor J. C. Cole of the Ontario agricultural college delivered during the first part of November an intensely interesting and instructive series of lectures in the university, covering a phase of agricultural economics and dealing more particularly with marketing farm produce. Professor Cole delivered from two to three lectures a day on the economic basis of marketing, assemblage, farm produce, grading and standardization, packing, processing, transportation, storing, financing, distribution, etc.

Professor E. H. Morrow returned the compliment by lecturing a week at the Ontario agricultural college, in addressing the students he spoke more from the standpoint of sales management.

HUMANE SOCIETY BUSY IN HOLIDAY SEASON

Inspector Tustin Tells of Efforts To Care For Stray Animals Here.

During the Christmas season the humane society of London has been very busy attending to animals which were in need of shelter and food.

"Animals which were in need of shelter and food," said Inspector George Tustin, "were just as much as persons do, and we made it our business to look after them in the best way possible."

During the month of December, 27 dogs and 23 cats were destroyed. Eighteen warrants for orders to animals were issued and 1,917 dogs were examined while in transit.

Twenty-seven emergency calls for animals in the streets were made to and information was given in 42 cases.

Two prosecutions are pending and the total number of cases attended to numbered 202.

Many horses and cattle were also looked after by the society in cases where urgent assistance was required at once.

Mr. Tustin said this afternoon that the report for the month of November showed that over 300 cases had been looked after.

A letter dated Dec. 20 from J. W. Wilson, general manager of the "Animal Society," Toronto, was received by Mr. Tustin this morning highly complimenting him on his fine work for this month.

VARIETY OF ARTICLES ARE FOUND BY POLICE

FEW CHANGES MADE IN YEAR IN LONDON'S MANY CHURCHES

Only Eight Congregations See Change in Pulpit During 1924

EVENLY DIVIDED

The year 1924 has seen only eight changes amongst 50 ministers, rectors and priests in the city of London.

Two changes have occurred in both the Baptist and Roman Catholic churches and one change in each of the Anglican, Congregational, Wesleyan and Methodist churches.

In the Baptist church the pulpit of Adelaide street church has been vacated owing to the resignation of its pastor, Rev. Floyd T. Holland, to the United States. Rev. W. M. Macdonald of Owen Sound has but lately come to town as pastor of St. Martin's church.

The outstanding change in the Roman Catholic church is that which transferred Right Rev. Mons. P. J. McKee from St. Peter's cathedral to St. Martin's church, and brought Rev. Fr. Stanley from Woodstock to assume charge of the cathedral. Mons. McKee succeeded Rev. Fr. Foster at St. Martin's.

The only change noted in connection with the Anglican churches of the city is in the appointment of Rev. G. A. Lightbourne as assistant to St. Paul's cathedral in succession to Rev. Denny Bright, who resigned to accept a parish at Blenheim.

The resignation of Rev. Matthew Kelly of the First Congregational church, Dundas street, last April, to accept a pastorate in Terre Haute, Ind., has created a vacancy which has not as yet been filled.

Rev. J. W. Crawford of Wilton Grove Presbyterian church has taken charge of the church at Chelsea since N. Miller has returned to Toronto to complete his college course.

Rev. T. Cosby Morris moved to Sarnia, and Rev. J. E. J. Millard came to the city last June as minister of the Askin Street Methodist church.

A number of the Methodist churches of the city will have different ministers on January, 1925, rolls round, since at least six or seven of the churches of that denomination have already extended invitations to new men, the changes to take effect at the beginning of the conference year next June.

Just what effect the question of church union and the United Church of Canada, now being voted on by the majority of the Presbyterian congregations of the city is distinctly problematical.

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WALLACE J. LAUT GOES TO TORONTO

Former Managing Editor of The Advertiser Secures Important Post.

Wallace J. Laut, for years identified with the advertising firm of McConnell & Ferguson, will leave for Toronto to become sales and advertising director with the investment house of Homer L. Gibson & Co. It was announced today.

During his connection with McConnell & Ferguson, Mr. Laut has been engaged in a number of notable campaigns having to do with the development of Canadian natural resources and has written several articles dealing with the potential and actual wealth of Ontario's hinterland. These articles have received considerable comment as to the necessity for advertising northern Ontario to the world, and including to the people of Ontario.

Homer Gibson is one of the northern pioneers, being heavily interested in mining. He believes in developing the active employment possibilities to the world and selected Mr. Laut as a man particularly qualified to undertake the work.

Mr. Laut will direct a semi-monthly publication dealing with Ontario's natural resources and the facts concerning investment opportunities. He will cooperate with several official movements now under way to give world-wide publicity to the gold and other resources of the province.

While leaving the active employment of McConnell & Ferguson, Mr. Laut retains his connection with the firm for the performance of special work. For several clients, he received his newspaper and advertising experience largely on London newspapers, having been city editor of the London Free Press and later serving as managing editor of The London Advertiser for six years. He will be succeeded as head of the preparation department at McConnell & Ferguson by Olaf P. Reznitzky, of The Advertiser editorial staff, formerly connected with the Montreal office of the agency.

Porteous transferred to Rectory street.

Inspector Greer's recommendation that Miss Gertrude Jeeves be appointed permanently to the nursing staff in place of Miss Amy Blair, resigned, was also adopted by the board.
