An Opportunity For All London.

The people of London are now presented with an opportunity to secure the new hotel which the city has needed so urgently and so long. On exchange of properties which will put the hotel on Dundas street; secondly, the granting of a fixed assessment of \$200,000 for a ten-year period.

These two points will appear on the ballot as separate questions. They are, however, to all intents and purposes, one question: "Do you want a new hotel?" Both the fixed assessment opportunity will be gone.

The city council very properly decided to exclude any question regarding the building of a new city hall. The ballot will be in the simplified form which The Advertiser has advocated, with the issue confined to the job in hand, the hotel, and there is little doubt that the public will endorse the action of the council and assist the progress of the city by giving sweeping approval.

The need of a new hotel in London is traditional; the lack of it has been a handicap to London for many years. It is essential if the city is to attract trade which will bring business to all classes. Even during its construction there are immediate advantages. The construction company estimates that one-third of its cost, or over \$300,000, will be spent in the wages of those employed in building it. Three hundred thousand dollars in wages for city workmen in winter, means more comforts for London homes, more money for London stores. In addition to this \$300,000 in direct wages, the building of the hotel means employment for scores of men in other establishments throughout the city.
