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WOMAN FACES CHARGE OF MURDERING HUSBAND

Woman Arrested in New
Brunswick at Instance of
Quebec Police.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 10.—Charged
with the murder of her husband at
Aylmerville, Que., in August last,
Mrs. Abraham Gallop, a woman about
40 years of age, was arrested here
yesterday.

Quebec officers left with their pris-
oner last night for Roberval, Que.,
where the trial will take place.
Abraham Gallop died at Aylmer-
ville, August 6 last, and the remains,
accompanied by the widow, were
taken to Springhill, York County, N.
B., for burial. Later at the instance
of the attorney-general of Quebec,
the body of Gallop was exhumed and
an autopsy is alleged to have re-
vealed strychnine in the stomach.

ST. ANNE DE BELLEVUE THREATENED BY FIRE

Quebec Village Near Montreal
Faces Destruction by
Flames.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—The village of
Ste. Anne de Bellevue, about 20 miles
from this city, is threatened by de-
struction by a fire which started in
the Clarendon hotel at 11 o'clock to-
night. Last reports received from
the village stated that the hotel had
been destroyed, and that the flames
were spreading to other buildings. A
detachment of the Montreal fire bri-
gade has been sent to the scene by
a special train.

KEEP FAITH OF FOREFATHERS CHARGE OF POPE'S ADVISER

Exhortation to live up always to
the faith of their forefathers, handed
down from generation to genera-
tion from the time of St. Peter, the
first pope of Rome, was the out-
standing advice in the sermon de-
livered by Rev. Fr. Bernardino M.
Russo, procurator-general of the
Third Order Regular of St. Francis
and adviser to the present pope, Pius
XI, before the Italian Catholics of the
city in St. Peter's hall at 9 o'clock
mass yesterday.

An unusually large number of his
countrymen were present to hear Rev.
Fr. Russo's sermon, which was de-
livered in his native Italian.
Taking his text, "Many are called,
but few are chosen," from the gospel
for the day, Father Russo pointed out
how a constant conscientious obser-
vance of the law of God was necessary
before one could hope to attain the
kingdom of heaven.

"Today's gospel," he said, "tells us
of the guests who were invited to the
wedding feast, but who ignored the
summons of the king, whose son was
to be wed. The people of today who

fail to heed the word of God are
similar to these. If we allow worldly
pride or ambition or an excessive
pursuit to pleasure keep us from be-
lieving the good Christians we should be,
we are almost sure to incur the wrath
of God, just as the king's proposed
guests were put to death after they
had ignored his visitation, and then
beaten the servants sent out to bring
them to the marriage feast."

"It is not an easy matter to follow
the path of humility and abnegation
along which the feet of Christ were
to tread that we might be shown the
way to eternal happiness, but those
who do follow this path, no matter
how stony it is, or how much they are
taunted by scoffers along the way,
have always strength in knowing that
their reward will be a great one, and
that at the end of their journey there
will be waiting for them a beneficent
Father, who will bless them for their
perseverance, and welcome them to
His presence with the words, 'Many
are called, but few are chosen. You
are chosen.'"

15 CRIMINAL CASES IN WINDSOR COURT

Janisse Murder Trials and
Manslaughter Charge Attract
Public Attention.

Windsor, Oct. 11.—When spectators
and counsel stand to honor the en-
trance of the presiding justice at the
opening of the fall sittings of the
supreme court at Sandwich tomorrow,
the largest docket of criminal and
civil actions ever presented in Essex
county will await the court's atten-
tion.

Sixty-one cases, fifteen of them
criminal charges, ranging in seri-
ousness from murder down, 31 of
them non-jury civil actions and the
remaining fifteen civil cases slated
for jury hearing, will be laid before
Mr. Justice Grant, at the first sittings
over which he has presided since his
recent elevation to the supreme court
of Ontario.

Of the fifteen cases on the criminal
list, public attention is centered most
closely on the two murder charges
against Ruth Janisse and her hus-
band, Arthur, charged with joint
responsibility for the death of Clayton
McMullin, shot to death on a public
street in Windsor on the night of
August 13, 1925.

Second only to this in the atten-
tion it has attracted is a man-
slaughter charge against Wilfrid
Penland, in whose car Lorette Dube,
400 Glenora street, was drowned on
the morning of March 30 this year.

DROWNING VICTIM IS NOW IDENTIFIED

Body of T. H. Carr of Paris
Recognized by Wood-
stock Brother.

Woodstock, Oct. 11.—Samuel G.
Carr of Paris last night identified the
body which was found in a creek
near Richwood, Blenheim township,
on Friday afternoon. Along with
Chief Forester of Paris, Mr. Carr
came to Drumbo to see the body, and
declared it was that of his brother,
Thomas Henry Carr, who had been
missing from his boarding-house in
Paris for about ten days. Apparently
the body had been about that length
of time in the water.

The relatives of the deceased man
are strongly inclined to believe that
he committed suicide, as he had been
in a very depressed and unsettled
condition of mind for some time past.
It was at first thought that he had
been robbed of his money and pocket-
book, but this fear was dispelled when
these articles were found in the room
where he had boarded. Carr was a
bachelor. An inquest is being held
tomorrow at Drumbo.

ST. THOMAS MAN IN FATAL ACCIDENT

Struck by M. C. Train and
Dies in Hospital of
Injuries.

St. Thomas, Oct. 11.—William Gay-
mer, an employee of the Michigan
Central roundhouse, was injured in
the west end of the depot beyond the
Ross street subway at 6 o'clock this
evening, and died at 7:15 o'clock at
the Memorial hospital.

Mr. Gaymer was evidently return-
ing from work to his home on
Catherine street, by the subway,
crossing in front of the White
Terraces, when the yard engine,
driven by W. Carter, with H. Kirk-
man, firing, struck him. The wheels
of the locomotive severed an arm and
mangled his side. He lived for
slightly more than an hour after-
wards.

Mr. Gaymer saw service in India,
and was well-known in the city. He
leaves a crippled wife and two chil-
dren at home, aged 7 and 4. Three
other children by a former wife, are
placed in homes in London and Ayl-
mer. He was past middle life, and
a member of the Salvation Army of
this city. An inquest has been
ordered by Coroner Dr. Ewin.

THREE ARE HURT AS AUTO DITCHES

St. Thomas Men Injured When
Car Is Crowded Off Road
Near Aylmer.

Aylmer, Oct. 11.—A bad automobile
accident occurred in front of the
residence of Rev. W. Fansher, on the
provincial highway, just west of
Aylmer, about 1 P. M. today. Three
young St. Thomas men, Messrs.
Peppes, Black, and Clunas, were
driving west in a sedan, when a car
coming east crowded them off the
pavement. They were thrown into
the ditch.

John Matthews and Fred Ingram,
who reside near the scene, and who
saw the accident, rushed over and
found all three young men badly cut
by broken glass. One man was
thrown half-way through the wind-
shield, another through the glass
door, and a third was lying in the
bottom of the car, which was prac-
tically ruined. They were carried
into the residence of Rev. Fansher,
Dr. McLeay, of Aylmer, was called,
and dressed the many cuts, but
could not ascertain as yet the extent
of the young men's injuries. They
are very badly shaken up and
bruised, but were removed to St.
Thomas this afternoon. The car,
which crowded them off the road,
said to have been speeding, never
stopped.

BLIZZARD ON ATLANTIC DISABLES FIVE CRAFT

U. S. Coastguard Patrol Boats
in Distress On Sea-
board.

Boston, Oct. 11.—The storm that
lashed the Atlantic seaboard last
night and yesterday disabled or dis-
tressed five craft was revealed in
radio messages received here today.
Four were coastguard patrolboats
operating in New England waters.
The coastguard patrolboats 123,
238, 127 and 147, operating out of
Nantucket, Boston and New London,
were caught in the 70-mile gale. To-
night the crew of six of the 128 had
been rescued by Cunarder Com-
erona, the 238 was still adrift, and
the 147 was reported picked up by
the cutter Mojave, which was towing
her back to her base.

Check Passer Dislikes Canada
