Chambers of Commerce Send Forty-Two Superannuated After Attaining 70 Years in Ontario.

Toronto, July 18 .- The total num ber of civil service employees super annuated during the year ending October 31, was 65, according to the second annual report of the super-annuation board of the province which has just been issued.

Forty-two of this number had attained the age of 7 years, 18 were superannuated on the ground of physical disability, four retired on their own option and one was re-tired owing to reorganization of the staff.
