GERMANY WILL SET RHINELAND AFRIFT DUE TO BIG EXPENSE

Expect Ruhr Leaders Must
Solve Own Problems—
Will Allies Aid?

"PASSING THE BUCK"

New Solution Will Require
Complete Reversal in Repara-
tions Procedure.

Associated Press Despatch.
Berlin, Nov. 14.—After November 25, Germany no longer will be able to meet the drain upon her exchequer for the payment of unemployment doles in the Ruhr and the Rhineland, and will then set both these regions adrift, permitting them to shift for themselves.

This direct statement was made in official quarters here tonight. Unless Chancellor Stresemann arrives at a different conclusion after pending conferences with leaders in the occupied areas, as the Reichstag opposes such a policy, it is now believed that the immediate future of the Rhineland and the Ruhr will be wholly determined by the nature of agreements which the local leaders are able to enter into with the French employment doles which the German government is paying out to unem-
ployed men and women in the Rhineland and the Ruhr will amount to 200,000,000 gold marks in the next ten days.

An autonomous state in the present stage of occupation and under prevailing economic and social conditions is viewed in Berlin circles as inexpedient and not feasible, and the inclination in government quarters appears to favor a plan to hold the occupying powers responsible for getting the local populace fed and back to work, and otherwise readjusting completely the desolated conditions in all lines.

Wholly Independent.
In the event the latter solution is adopted, the Berlin government will invest the local German authorities with plenipotentiary powers, authorizing them to deal with the French, Belgian and British authorities, thus making the occupied zones tem-

porarily wholly independent of official intervention by the central government. Chancellor Stresemann and other champions of the proposed plan to jettison the Ruhr and the Rhineland, are under military occupation, believe that passing "economic autonomy" is the solution to the problem now confronting the government along the Rhine. Any movement in these areas in the direction of forcing the establishment of autonomous state would require the initial support of one-third of the qualified voters and a consequent three-fifths vote for ultimate ratification.

There is an apparent desire to pass along the buck to France and Belgium, leaving the German populace to make its peace with the occupying powers for an indefinite period and permitting the central government to wash its hands of the legacy bequeathed it by nine months of passive resistance.

Separate Agreements.
If this solution is adopted by the central government it will, incidentally, press for a complete reversal of procedure with reference to reparations; and, while no statement is forthcoming in this respect, it is assumed the creditor powers would have to enter into separate agreements with the industrialists regarding deliveries, while the question of gold payment would be protested by Germany on the ground that she was deprived of uninterrupted disposition of her complete economic organiza-
tion or a demand would be made for a postponement of cash payments until the country's financial situation had sufficiently recuperated to warrant them. The impending decisions with respect to the Ruhr and the Rhineland therefore have a weighty bearing on Germany's foreign relations, as well as on the further trend of internal events.

Voerwaerts, the Socialist mouth-piece, declares the proposed policy of temporary abandonment of the occupied prospect of regaining them at some future time and it upbraids the men "who prefer to sing 'The Watch on the Rhine' than to keep it."

President Lore has summoned the Reichstag for next Tuesday when the political situation will be discussed.
