The young salmon which are now beong hatched at the Harrison Lake institution are sockeye, sohoes and spring salmon, but the sockeyes com-pose by far the greater part of the natch. hatch. There are approximately twenty-six million sockeyes, two mil-

twenty-six million sockeyes, two mil-lion spring saiman. The ova were collected over a long season and consequently are hatching at various periods. The first eggs taken hatched out several weeks ago, and the young saimon are now being liberated, but the last eggs collected will not be out for a month yet, and it will be the end of March or the beginning of April before the last young salmon are given their liberty. The hatchery was built to accommodate a hatch of twenty million, but by using these ponds the staff has been able to take care of an-other ten millions.
