CHEAPER TEXT BOOKS.
One Probable Result of the New Contract for School Readers.

The Government contract for the publication of school readers, at present existing with the Canada Publishing Company, the Copp, Clark Company, and the W. J. Gage Company expired Dec. 31st, and the plates therefore, which are vested in the Department, are returnable to the Government.

The intention of the Department is to publish an entirely new series of readers. These, it is expected will be superior in subject matter, paper, presswork and binding to the present issue, and the aim of the Government, in accordance with its pronounced policy, will be to give these books to the parents at a reduced cost. It will, however, probably take a year or eighteen months to prepare the new issue, and what line of policy the Department will determine upon has not yet been made public. It is not unlikely, however, that tenders may be asked for books up to the specific standard.

As to the interim it is not probable any action will be taken pending the report of the Text Book Commission.

WORKERS FOR THE ONTARIO FARMERS.
Plans to Bring 10,000 Men From England to Settle in This Province.

Mr. Robert Verity has been appointed Ontario representative of the Central Emigration Committee of Great Britain, which is practically under the control of the British Government and oversees the work of the local District Committees that share the Government grant for the assistance of the unemployed.

Of these the Central Committee expects to send 10,000 or 12,000 to settle in Ontario this year. It will not be unemployed persons who will seek new homes in the Province, but picked men temporarily out of work. They will have to pass a strict medical examination in the Mother Country. Their past history will be the subject of enquiry, and a report will be obtained as to their conduct from the police of their place of origin and other authorities. On their arrival in Canada they will be met by the agent of the committee at the port of entry. They will then be sent to Toronto. Those who desire to do farm work will then be located by the Bureau of Colonization. For the remainder it will be the duty of Mr. Verity to find positions.

The Ontario Government has arranged with Commissioner Combs of the Salvation Army to take charge of the management, under Government supervision, of the new immigration shelter at the corner of Peter and Wellington streets. The army will lodge the immigrants at a specific sum per head and will furnish the interior fittings of the shelter. The Government guarantees an average of 300 lodgers per week the year round. It is expected the cost to the Province will be about \$3,000 per year.
