To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis County: Gentlemen: As your Inspector for enforcing the Canada Temperance Act I now respectfully submit the following report of my work for the year just closed:

Twelve informations for search warrants and prosecutions were laid and acted upon, but in the greater part of the cases preliminary hearings only were conducted under the provisions of Section 655 of the criminal code, resulting in the abandonment of the prosecutions through lack of sufficient testimony to ensure the conviction of the alleged offender if he were summoned for trial. This process has, in each instance, cost the Municipality less than an actual trial of the defendant with the same result, by the amount of constables' and magistrates' fees which would have been expended in securing his attendance. In the last case, partially tried on the sixth day of the present month, evidence nearly conclusive of the guilt of the defendant was given, and the case was adjourned until the 13th instant for the securing of further and sufficient evidence which I believe to be available. In the three instances in which search warrants were issued, no liquor was found, although a thorough search was made for it. As a general result, therefore, while no conviction has been secured, twelve cases have been thoroughly investigated, and the cost to the Municipality is little more than half the amount which you were asked to pay for the year 1910 was \$361.70, while for 1911 it is only \$153.23.

and more restricted—the Town of Middleton has been carved out of our territory, and, at least three old offenders from whom large amounts in fines and costs used to be collected yearly, have practically gone out of the liquor business.

I am sure that there is now no open liquor selling in our Municipality, and I believe, very little is sold in any way, and this improved condition has been brought about by the vigorous enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act in my allotted district. Ease up in this work or abandon it for even one year and I believe all the evils that we have practically overcome would be upon us again in full force. The importation of liquors from the cities, allowed by law for "personal use" is, without doubt, still carried on to some extent, and the chief liquor drinking in our communities is from this source. It will be impossible to subvert this condition wholly until the clause allowing importation for personal use is struck from the Act.

I have exercised due diligence, I believe, in instituting proceedings whenever bona fide complaints have been made to me, and have also taken the initiative myself whenever indications seemed to warrant it. I have, however, paid no attention to anonymous communications, nor to such as related exclusively to Town territories over which I have no jurisdiction. I have on many occasions taken my own team and driven many miles over the District for the purpose of enquiries as to violations of the act, and attending examinations before the magistrate for which I have not charged the Municipality one cent. I tried to do the most efficient work in my power at the least possible cost, and the result is herewith placed before you, gentlemen, in the shape of my general account with itemized accounts attached.
