Where is the taller of the two boys ? He is standing quite close to the dog's head.

The smaller of the two boys is where ? He is standing between the fence and the cart.

What has he in his right-hand ? He has a whip and one of the reins in his right hand.

In his other hand what has he ? In his other hand he has the other rein.

Is he holding the reins tight or loose ? He is holding them loose.

He is looking in what direction ? He is looking straight ahead.

How comes it that it is the smaller of the two boys who is holding the reins ? I don't know, but I suppose the bigger boy allows the smaller one to hold the reins till they start.

What has the bigger boy on his feet and on his legs from his knees down? He has nothing on his feet neither has he anything on his legs from his knees down; he is bare-footed and he is bare-legged from his knees, down.
