The Russian player, Winawer, is taking the lead, and Blackburne follows him very closely.

THE PARIS CHESS CONGRESS.

The play in the International Tournament has now arrived at a most interesting crisis. Winawer and Blackburne still keep their lead: but Anderssen has fallen behind, and Rosenthal has taken the third place, with Zukertort as a good fourth. It will be worth taking note of what has been accomplished by the four leaders. Winawer played with Bird, Englisch, Gifford, Mason and Pitschell, winning nine games right off, but losing the tenth, which was with Englisch. Blackburne has fought with Englisch, winning and drawing, with Gifford winning both, with Mackenzie winning and losing, with Mason winning and drawing, and with Fitschell winning both. Rosenthal has played against Gifford and Pitschell, winning all four games, against Bird winning and losing, against Mason winning and losing. Zukertort has met Bird and Gifford, winning in all four games; he lost and drew with Mackenzie won and drew with Mason, and made two draws with Englisch. We hear that the first prize has been raised to 9,000 francs, and that a fifth and sixth prize will be given. We are sorry to hear that Mr. Blackburne is suffering from a violent cold ant sore throat. The following table shows the state of each player's score at the conclusion of the fifth round:—


