Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, my hon. friend should be aware that there is no discretion for the minister in these matters. The cases have been heard by the immigration appeal board and as a result of the hearings deportation orders have been issued, which the department is bound to carry out as soon as practicable.

Mr. Haidasz: As a supplementary question, could the minister inform the house when he will act on the government's 1966 white paper on immigration and, specifically, proposals 54 and 55 dealing with refugees and seamen?

Mr. MacEachen: Mr. Speaker, Canada's treatment of refugees conforms both in spirit and to the letter with the international convention and protocol. We have under active consideration at present the formal acceptance of this convention and protocol, which we are scrupulously observing.

INQUIRY AS TO PAYMENT OF SALARY ARREARS
