REQUEST FOR SUMMARY OF INTER-PRETATIONS BY OFFICIALS

WHEAT-GRADES IN POSITION FOR SHIPMENT

Mr. George Muir (Lisgar): Mr. Speaker, yesterday the minister told us he would be making a report on the shipments of grain for export. Is he prepared to do that today?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): I have figures with regard to the Lakehead and the movements from there. I cannot say whether this is for export or upstream—I don't know what the word is, but there must be a word, possibly storage. The movement—

An hon. Member: Do you know what you are talking about?

Mr. Pepin: Much more than you know.

Mr. Hees: So there; so there!

Mr. Pepin: The movement up to May 7 this year is 30.3 million bushels as opposed to 31.7 million bushels last year. So, it is about the same. With regard to Churchill, the elevator of Churchill is full to its working capacity of 4.7 million bushels. The rail movement of grain to Churchill will commence about July, just before the opening of the Churchill shipping season which extends from the last week of July to mid October.

Mr. Muir (Lisgar): Since the minister is so full of spirit today I wonder whether he could instil some of it into our grain export.
