CBC-MR. MARK STAROWICZ

Question No. 581-Mr. Cossitt:

1. Was CBC producer Mark Starowicz appointed to a senior position with the television news on or about January 1, 1980 and (a) if so (i) what are his qualifications for the position (ii) what are the names and job designations of all those recommending him for such a position (b) if not, is he being considered?

2. Is the government aware as to whether or not security records show that he consorted with Soviet journalist and KGB officer Konstantin Geyvendov and that such facts have been confirmed in the Ontario legislature by the attorney general and, if so, in what way can the government justify the appointment of Mr. Starowicz to a position which deals with the dissemination of news to the Canadian people when he has been reported to have a record of Communist associations

Mr. Peter Stollery (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State and Minister of Communications): In so far as the Department of the Secretary of State is concerned:

In so far as the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation is concerned: the CBC has announced that Mark Starowicz will

be joining the English television network's current affairs department and will be in charge of development of the new program which will follow "The National" when it moves to 10 p.m.

(a) and (b). The circumstances of CBC employees' employment and assignments are among those details of internal management and administration which parliament has not, as a matter of custom, required the CBC to provide. The background to this custom was explained in detail in the reply to question No. 2,530, May 22, 1975.

Second part: The CBC was established as a Crown corporation for the purpose of producing and broadcasting, independently of political or commercial interference, programs for a national broadcasting service. Within its terms of reference the Corporation has the sole right and responsibility for hiring and work assignments.
