But the Queen's Ministers, finding the said Hostilities continued, resolved to take such Measures as not only put a Stop to the Progress of the French in those Parts, but had drove them out of all that Continent, if Sir HAVINDER WALKER'S Expedition had not unfortunately miscarried in the Year 1711. However, the French were obliged, by the Treaty of Utrecht, to restore all they had taken from us, and to confirm our Right to all the Lands on the South Side of the River St. Laurence, as will more fully appear by the Articles of the faid Treaty. But, thro' an Infatuation or Neglect in us, the French have been fuffered to hold all the Lands they had poffessed themselves of as aforefaid on the South Side of the River St. Laurence, fave only Nova Scotia; and altho' the late 'Treaty, of Aix le Chapelle further confirmed the faid Treaty of Utretcht, yet the French now spirit up their Indians underhand to harrass and difturb us even in the Possession of that Colony, and keep a constant Body of Regular Troops upon the Peninfula of the faid Colony, and have thrown up Fortifications there to protect the faid Indiane.

Their being left in Poffession of those Lands on the South Side of the River St. Laurence, has given LEWIS the XVth. a proper Handle to resume the Designs formed by his Great Grandfather; and he has fo well followed his Proceedings as to find 1500 Regular Troops to that Continent, the very Year he figned the Treaty of Aix le Chapelle, and has continued fending more Troops there every Year fince; and his Governors have continually spirited up the Indians in Alliance with them to make In-Incustions upon the Indians in Alliance with us, and have always fent French Officers and Regular Troops along with their faid Indians, in order to lead them on in every Incursion they have made, and now do make, against our said Indian Allies since the last Peace: And, as the said Indians have not been properly affifted by us, the French have fo overpowered the faid Indians, that they dare not lift up their Hands against them; whilst they (the French) have made Lodgments, and built such a Chain of Forts, upon the Lands of the faid Indians, as cover the whole Country which the French have usurped as aforesaid along from the South Side of the Mouth of the River St. Laurence up along the South Sides of the faid Lakes, and fo on along the South Side of the River Miffiffippe, to where it empties itself in the Bay or Gulph of Mexico.

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
