# BRITISH SPORTSMEN IN THE CASUALTIES

Also Well-Known Athletes Receive Well-Deserved Promotion.

London, April 19.—British sportsmen continue to fall on the western front, the latest casualty list issued containing many well-known names. Lieut. H. C. Boycott, died of wounds, was the famous international hockey player. He was capped for England in 1900 and played in ten representative games, being captain of the team which in 1904 defeated Scotland. Lieut. Bassett, the well-known rugby player of the Lancashire Club, has been wounded for the fourth time. Another prominent hockey player to lose his life is Major R. G. Pridmore. He played for England many times and represented Great Britain in the 1905 Olympic games. He was also a good cricketer and rugby footballer. Capt. A. Clifford Saville, killed, was a fine all-round athlete, appearing several times for Middlesex County cricket.
