MILLIONS EARNED BY 'PHONE TRUST

Growth of the Business in the United States as Shown in the Reports of the Subsidiary Companies.

Growth of the telephone business throughout the United States is brought out forcibly in the annual reports of the subsidiary companies of the American (Bell) Telephone & Telegraph Co. for 1905, which are now being issued.

The trust's greatest earner is its subsidiary companies in the New York Telephone Company, which has a capital stock of \$50,000,000.

In the list of annual reports the earnings of this company are not given, although the Merchants' Association of New York completed its examination in September a year ago the statistics showed that it earned net 14.64 per cent. on the money invested.

HAPPENINGS IN HAMILTON ATTACK ON NEWSPAPERS

May Be Called on to Defend Alleged Libel Suits in Grocers' Guild Case.

Hamilton, June 18.—(Special).—E. F. B. Johnston, K.C., who is defending the Grocers' Guild against the charge of conspiracy, took a fling at the newspapers this afternoon. The newspapers, he said, will have the pleasure of paying counsel fees to defend a charge of libel if they continue their present conduct. What Mr. Johnston complained of was the scare headlines that some of the newspapers put on their reports of the case. He said they were in the nature of comment. No person could control what the newspapers printed, but they ought to have some sense of decency. A fair report was all that any honest newspaper would want to give.

Police Magistrate Jeffs agreed that Mr. Johnston had cause to complain, and he advised him to caution the crown attorney, whose duty would be to lay a charge against the newspapers. WHITEFISH DISAPPEARING.

Canadian Lake Fishermen Have Bad Season—Reasons Given.

Canadian fishermen along the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair are complaining of the scarcity of fish this spring.

Consul Conant of Detroit says that the fishermen are not doing sufficient business to pay expenses. The scarcity of fish and perch is felt more than the other kinds of fish. A few years ago this class of fish was found in abundance in the Detroit River. Today these fish are much in demand, and the fishermen are unable to supply their customers.

Fishermen claim that the supply of 25,000,000 fry of whitefish sent out by the Sandwich hatchery to repopulate the great lakes is not being the amount necessary to meet the depletion of this variety of fish by reason of fishing and the destruction by other aquatic animals of the young fish in the rivers. Millions of mullets, suckers, carp and other varieties feed upon the whitefish fry, and it is estimated that only one per cent of the hatchery output of a thousand reaches maturity. Another factor in this lack of fish is thought to be the dredging work being carried on at Amherstburg.

The hatchery at Sandwich has a capacity for handling over a hundred million whitefish fry, but they cannot secure the whitefish during the spawning season to extract the eggs. The whitefish is fast disappearing and will soon be as rare as the buffalo on terra firma. The department expends for the propagation and protection of inland fisheries in Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and the provinces in the north-west only \$50,000 a year for all purposes, while the sum of \$550,000 is expended for the advantage of fishermen in the maritime provinces," declares a Windsor fisherman who has spent many years in the business.

Fishermen have observed, especially near French River, how the whitefish deposit their eggs. The water on the shoals is very shallow. The rocky beds would be literally covered with spawn, when suddenly schools of soft fish would appear and the eggs disappear, only a fraction being left in the crevices of the rock. This war of extermination is the general belief that the "cello," which is in fine condition, has been exhibited for a meeting of the Cremona Society in London, where it was inspected by many enthusiastic collectors. WHAT NIAGARA COSTS. It's Expenses Put at \$122,500,000 and \$0,000,000 Tons of Coal Annually.

W. H. Buck, an engineer writing for The Outlook, makes out that we have an expensive luxury in Niagara Falls.

The total hydraulic energy of the Falls, says Mr. Buck, would represent about 3,500,000 horse power. To generate one horse power continuously for a year by steam engine requires about 13 tons of coal.

To generate electric power by steam with the most modern steam plant costs not less than \$70 a horse power a year, allowing for fixed charges and operating expenses. Niagara power can be generated and sold in large quantities for \$15 a horse power a year, or for \$35 a horse power a year less than is possible from the use of coal and the steam engine.

From the above it will be seen that the hydraulic energy of the Falls would result to the country an annual saving of \$122,500,000 of 50,000,000 tons of coal per year, or for \$122,500,000 horse power, for \$122,500,000. These figures illustrate what it costs the people of this continent annually to maintain Niagara Falls as a spectacle. They represent the saving to those who would consume the power, and not the profit of those who might own the power developments.

This winter involved in prohibiting the development of Niagara power, might be likened to a great configuration in which 50,000,000 tons of coal were annually consumed. Such a configuration might come from the world, and it is but human nature to wonder to be justified in using every effort to stop the waste by putting out the fire.
