

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS
COST OF STREET CAR STRIKE
AS SHOWN IN THE RECEIPTS

Earnings for 1906 \$21,000 Less Than They Would Otherwise Have Been.

Hamilton, Jan. 22.—(Special).—W. C. Vansickle, reeve of Ancaster Township, was last afternoon elected warden of Wentworth County on the first ballot. Although there are eight Liberals to six Conservatives in the council, the Liberals were after the honor. They got together, however, and Reeve Vansickle was elected.

The following officers were elected this evening by the Liberal Club: President, Cal Davis; vice-president, J. H. Fowler; secretary-treasurer, Frank Woolcott.

The Conservative Club held its annual old folks at home this evening. Mayor Stewart presided. Those who took part were Miss Flossie Kinrade, Fred Mitchell, Miss Jessie Morgan, H. N. Thomas, Miss Alice Hunter, Thos. L. Sweeney, Mrs. McArthur and the Masseria Male Quartet.

The married men of Centenary Church gave a social this evening. J. O. Callaghan presided.

Cost of the Strike.
The receipts of the Hamilton Street Railway last year amounted to \$248,776, not including the Deering division. That is just about \$2,000 less than the earnings would have been had there been no strike. In spite of the strike, the receipts show an increase over 1905 of \$14,415. The city's share amounted to \$7,207, or only \$273 more than in 1905. The city's loss in percentage by reason of the strike is estimated at \$1705. The services of the soldiers who put down the riot cost the city \$3204.

At 11 o'clock this morning the 49th annual convention of the Grand Chapter of Canada will be formally opened, when the reports of the grand first principal will be presented. These reports will show an increase of about 1000, or a total membership of 11,927. The election of officers will be completed with and a forecast gives the names Bro. James Leslie of Winnipeg as the probable first grand principal, George Monroe, Hamilton, second principal, and J. E. Heelervele of Sterling, third principal.

The grand superintendent will in all probability be R. W. Brennan of Toronto district.

POLICE STOPPED THE CARS SERVICE WAS ABANDONED

What Happened at Noon Yesterday When City's Orders Were Carried Into Effect.

That upon the application of the city engineer for the use of the police to enable him to obey the order of the city council to compel the Toronto Railway Company to restore the routes, which they have, without authority, changed on the Winchester, Bathurst and Arthur-street lines, the board of police commissioners, in view of the fact that the police force are maintained and paid at the cost of the citizens, feel the corporation are entitled to use the force in defence of their rights, and direct the chief to carry out the orders which he may receive from the corporation thru the city engineer, on the understanding that the corporation of the City of Toronto shall be responsible for any action taken under their orders.

The foregoing was the resolution passed by the board of police commissioners yesterday morning, Judge Winchester dissenting, as had been expected. He explained that his attitude was based purely legal ground, and that he believed, with Mr. Pullerton, that the city should await the decision of the privy council, expected next month. While not admitting that the railway had done wrong, he stated that the city was not entitled to use force, while entitled to redress in a legal way.

The mayor kept his promise not to block the application by giving the casting vote in favor of the city.

The police commissioners met promptly at 8 a. m., in City Engineer's office, and after a private conference of half an hour, City Engineer Rust was called in. Letting the Mayor, Corporation Counsel Pullerton and City Solicitor Chisholm were also summoned, and after about fifteen minutes of further discussion, the proceedings ended.

Entering the Law.

It was then decided to call on the police to enforce the city's requests at noon.

At Front and Yonge-streets, Engineer Rust took charge of operations, arriving about 10 minutes before noon. He had a yard foreman with him, armed with a heavy crowbar. Inspector Davis had about a dozen police at the corner and round about.

Winchester car 1018 was the first victim. When it reached the corner, the engineer ordered the switch turned so that the car would have to go west toward the station. The motorman declined to comply. In 10 minutes the car was stretched north on Yonge to Arthur-street.

Crowds from the warehouses assembled, anxious to go home to dinner, and their comments were not complimentary to the engineer. Finally, Homebody Nix and several assistants arrived, and he ordered the stalled Winchester car to be towed to the station. The motorman, however, was told to give place to a motorman from another route, owing to it being understood that the Winchester blockade was lifted.

As a Winchester car would reach the corner it was turned to the barns, a new man taking the motorman's place. The trouble was over by 12:30.
