EMPEROR "BILL'S" TOUR.

Great Reception to the Emperor and Empress at Constantinople.

constantinople, Oct. 19.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany were heartily cheered while driving to the German school yesterday. Their Majesties engaged in a long conversation with the teachers and children, and made minute enquiries as to the progress made by the school. Emperor William remarked that there were a large number of foreign children in attendance at the school, and he said this demonstrated the "victorious force of Germanism."

A number of songs, including the Turkish

hymn, were sung. The Emperor afterwards drove through the streets, preceded and fol-lowed by two squadrons of cavalry, and lowed by two squadrons of cavalry, and accompanied by a numerous suite. The houses of all the German residents were festooned with evergreens and decorated with German and Turkish flags. At the gala dinner given at the Yildiz Klosk yesterday evening 120 covers were laid. The local newspapers publish sympathetic articles on the visit of the Emperor and Enross of Germany to Turkey and assert press of Germany to Turkey, and assert that it will further consolidate the friend-ly relations between Turkey and Germany.

A MOST AWFUL CRIME.

Father and Four Children Murder ed in the Galician Settlement of Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Oct. 19.—There are no fresh developments in the Startburn quintuple murder case to-day. It looks as though it was the result of a conspiracy, in which four or five persons, including the mother of the children, are implicated. Arrests are

expected to-day.

The details of the tragedy are reported to be that Wasyl Bocehko, a Galician, live 1 with his wife and four children at Stuartburn, Man., about 25 miles east of Dominion City. The man and his children—two boys and two girls—were found dead in their home, having evidently been killed with an ax. The bodies showed by bruises and the floor and walls by blood that the utmost savagery had been shown in the killing. It is supposed they were murdered while asleep, and the crime was committed last Friday night. Some people think Indians or strangers did the deed, while others hold the opinion that the wife and mother, who is missing, is the guilty party. It is said the couple did not live happily

together. No arrests have been made. A clever swindle has been worked successfully by two young men on boarding house keepers. The men watched the advertisements of people who had rooms to rent, and then paid them a visit. They then agree to pay the rent in advance, and, producing a bill, usually a five, they receive the change and go away, promising to return with their things. The landlady never sees them again, and discovers that the bill is counterfeit.

The trick was played on a lady on Shuter street, but she discovered the fraud in time and got her change back. The police are on the trail of the men. Two Slick Young Men.

Mr. Cuthbert's refusal to hand up his cash without a fight secured for him a brutal beating. Mr. Cuthbert's face gives ample evidence of the treatment he received.
