WAS IT DUE TO MAGNETISM?

Peculiar Conditions Exist Near the

Manacles, Where the Ill-Fated

Morgan was Sunk.

London, Oct. 19.—Newspapers, in their reference to the loss of the Moberg, recall a story to the effect that peculiar and variable magnetic conditions exist near the Manacles, which are liable to disturb ships' compasses.

The wreck of the steamer Palmyra in that vicinity on March 14, 1885, in similar circumstances, is mentioned.

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EMPEROR WILLIAM'S TOUR.

Great Reception to the Emperor

and Empress at Constantinople.

Constantinople, Oct. 19.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany were heartily cheered while driving to the German legation, where they were met by a large number of officials, and a long conversation with the teachers and children, and made minute enquiries as to the progress made in the schools.

Emperor William remarked that there were a large number of foreign children in attendance at the school, and he said this demonstrated the "victorious force of Germanism."

A number of songs, including the Turkish march, were sung by the children, and were followed by two squadrons of cavalry, and accompanied by a numerous suite. The Emperor and Empress were then escorted to the Grand Palace, where they were met by a large number of officials, and a long conversation with the teachers and children, and made minute enquiries as to the progress made in the schools.

The local newspapers publish sympathetic articles on the visit of the Emperor and Empress of Germany to Turkey, and assert that it will further consolidate the friendly relations between Turkey and Germany.

A MOST AWFUL CRIME.

Father and Four Children Murder-

ed in the Galician Settlement

of Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Oct. 19.—There are no fresh developments in the Starbuck quadruple murder case to-day. It looks as though it was the result of a conspiracy, in which four or five persons, including the mother of the children, are implicated. Arrests are expected to-day.

The details of the tragedy are reported to be that Wasyi Bechko, a Galician, lived with his family in the Starbuck settlement, Man., about 25 miles east of Dominion City. The man and his children—two boys and two girls—were found dead in their home, having evidently been killed with an axe. The bodies showed by bruises and the floor and walls by blood that the father and mother had been shown in the killing. It is supposed they were murdered while asleep, and the crime was committed last Friday night. Some people think Indians or strangers did the deed, while others hold the opinion that the wife and mother, who is missing, is the guilty party. It is said the couple did not live happily together. No arrests have been made.

Two Sick Young Men.

A clever swindle has been worked successfully by two young men on boarding house keepers. The men watched the advertisements of people who had rooms to rent, and then paid them a visit. They then agreed to pay the rent in advance, and producing a bill, usually for \$10, they asked the change and went away, promising to return with their things. The landlady was then called, and the men disappeared. The trick was played on a lady on Slater street, but she refused the fraud and in time and got her change back. The police are on the trail of the men.

Markham Resident Held Up.

Matthew Cuthbert of Markham has reported to the police that he was held up and robbed of a watch and a sum of money on Victoria street on Saturday night last. Cuthbert's refusal to hand up his cash without a right secured for him a brutal beating. Mr. Cuthbert's face gives ample evidence of the treatment he received.
