TO OPPOSE GAS LEGISLATION

Council Will Be Asked by Legislation Committee to Fight Proposed Settlement.

WHEN IT REACHES LEGISLATURE

Resolution Passed Unanimously—What the Mayor Thinks of Committee's Action.

The gas question was brought before the Legislation and Reception Committee yesterday afternoon by Controller London, who moved that the committee recommend that the Council instruct the Corporation Counsel and City Solicitor to oppose any legislation which may be applied for to confirm any settlement of the present litigation with the Consumers' Gas Company until the same has been considered by the Council.

"Somebody will call that mutiny," said Ald. Curry.

"If that special meeting were asked for isn't called, this is the best way to bring the matter before the Council next Monday," said Ald. London.

The motion was carried unanimously without any further discussion. His Worship the Mayor, when informed by The World that the above motion had sailed so smoothly through the committee, said with his customary genial smile, that a single committee had nerve to attempt to undo the action of the Executive of the Council, which had been endorsed by the Council.

His Worship said that the draft of the application for legislation in regard to the settlement of the gas suit would be ready and would be gone over by the solicitors at a conference to-day. "Will it be ready for the Board of Control meeting to-day, or for the Council?" His Worship was asked.

"Now you can't reasonably expect a draft to go thru as quick as that. Doubtless some minor changes may be necessary."

"Can the Council rescind the action of the old Council endorsing the terms of the proposed settlement?" His Worship pointed out, however, that a two-thirds vote of the Council could upset the action of the last Council, also it would be a reflection upon the integrity and ability of the old Council. "However," smiled His Worship, "the Council will have a chance for discussion when the draft legislation is submitted."

The Mayor could not promise that the drafted bill would come up at the next meeting of the Council, but the matter will doubtless be discussed on the above recommendation of the Legislation Committee.

RUMORED SHIPPING DEAL

London, Jan. 21.—A representative of the Associated Press has secured an authoritative statement regarding the rumored shipping deal, which, while refuting the reports of the amalgamation of several lines, reveals the fact that negotiations towards a trade agreement are being conducted on a larger scale than hitherto hinted at. Every line trading between England and America, except one, has agreed to form a freight combination upon a basis considerably higher than the rates at present in force. That one of the firms involved, threatens to upset the proposed combination, but the other fifteen, constituting about 90 per cent. of the firms involved, withdrew their previous assent, declaring that unless this one exception came in the combination would be worthless. The line which has so disarranged the calculations is comparatively unimportant, and plies between London and the United States.

PRIVATE BILLS PRESENTED.

Yesterday Was Last Day for Introducing Them, and Accordingly There Was a Rush.

AN EXPLANATION BY MR. GIBSON

Of Work of Committee That Went Over Imperial Statutes in Force in Ontario.

The reading of prohibition petitions, about 50 in number, the introduction of private bills, it being the last day for receiving them, and the Attorney-General's explanation of the work done by the committee that had charge of the compilation of the Imperial statutes, constituted the business before the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

When the House opens this afternoon, Premier Rose will deliver his budget speech. He said on Monday that it would not be a lengthy one. Col. Matheson, the opposition's financial critic, will reply.

Mr. Gibson's explanation. In moving the second reading of his bill to provide for the revision of the statute law, the Attorney-General gave an exhaustive explanation of the work that had been done in connection with the compilation of the Imperial statutes. "Those who had taken the revision," he said, "to examine the new statute would have been surprised to find not only a compilation but a provincial legislation, but there were of their broad principles and application. The committee of judges who declined to act strictly on the Order-in-Council, and deal only with those statutes that had been introduced by legislation, but, after consultation, it was thought that it would be useful and interesting to include the other important measures, such as the famous Bill of Rights."

Then there was the Quebec Act, the Constitutional Act and various other laws respecting the validity of colonial laws—all these constituted the work of the committee. Part two was composed of acts of practical utility, which were in force because of their applicability. The Habeas Corpus Act, in its almost original wording, was also included in the appendix of the compilation. As being one of the fundamental planks of constitutional liberty, it was not to be excluded. A large number of Imperial statutes not applicable to Ontario, and which came within the jurisdiction of the Dominion parliament, were also included, although it was not the committee's work to deal with them.

While the volume which had been compiled was not very lengthy, the Attorney-General said the work should not be regarded as proportionate to the size of the result. There was an immense amount of work involved, but he was sure that the result more than made up for the trouble. The committee had taken, and that it would be found of great use to the legal profession and law students.

Praise From Opposition. Mr. Whitney assured the Attorney-General that his bill would meet with great acceptance, and it gave him very much pleasure to congratulate him on the result of the compilation.

The bill was then given its second reading.

Mr. Gibson's other two bills, respecting mortmain and the disposition of land for charitable use, and respecting the Imperial statutes, were also presented and given their second reading.
