4. ALL OVER BY OCTOBER 15 IS HOPE HELD AT OTTAWA

Several Government Bills Passed and Start Made on the Supplementary Estimates.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—(Special).—Brief but business-like was the sitting of the House to-day, the progress being such as to revive hopes of prorogation by Thanksgiving. Several government bills were advanced and a fair start made with the big supplementary estimates.

Money to Ministers.

This afternoon the House took up the bill to amend the act respecting the Department of Railways and Canals. It empowers the government to advance to the Minister of Railways from time to time the increasing funds to purchase and manufacture the necessary stores for the government railways and reorganizes the system of stores accounts.

In the course of the discussion, the matter of the printing done for the intercolonial in outside offices came up, and the opposition denounced the action of the government in changing the law whenever the Auditor-General attempted to live up to the act, as he understood it, and refused to pass printing accounts on the certificates of the King's Printer. It was claimed that the Auditor's mouth because he clashed with the government.

Mr. Fielding thought it curious that ever since the act of 1893 was passed, and up to a short time ago, the charge was that the Auditor-General should accept the certificate of the King's Printer that prices were fair, and he suddenly changed his mind and declared the practice of years was illegal. Mr. Fielding regarded it as a piece with the Auditor's recent action in regard to superannuation. For many years the practice was in counting the period of service to reckon time over six months as one year, and to strike out any time under six months. Suddenly the Auditor declared this was not the law, and so the government, regarding the practice which was instituted by the Conservatives, just had an act passed legalizing it.

Not for All Printing.

Mr. Fielding made the positive statement that he was not in favor of having all government printing contracted in the Printing Bureau, Ottawa. The bill passed after a protest by the opposition against the provision allowing the sum of \$1,000,000 to remain as a balance to the debt of stores accounts.

The bill to amend the Shipping Companies Act, which the Minister of Marine explained was designed to meet representations of the British Board of Trade and assure our loyal friends in the several temperance organizations of our confidence in the ultimate success of the effort to promote sobriety in Ontario.

The House went into Committee of Supply on the supplementary estimates and the first item taken up was one of \$70,000 for additional accommodations to the Parliament Building.

R. L. Borden referred to the inadequacy of the accommodation in the House, remarking that he was frequently compelled to resort to the corridors to do office work.

Col. Sam Hughes contrasted the inadequate accommodation in the Commons with the luxurious surroundings of the Senate.

"To be most fastidious over there," said the Minister of Justice, "and we all expect to go there some time," the Minister of Finance observed, laughing.

Bad Ventilation.

A discussion ensued upon the bad ventilation of the chamber. Mr. Bell of Picton urged that the government take action towards improving the atmosphere which was so bad as to be conducive to illness among members who were at all constant in their attendance.

After some further complaints in the same direction the Minister of Public Works promised to have the architect of the department look into the matter and see what could be done.

The vote which was \$75,000 for additional dredging at Port Arthur and Fort William, and of \$46,000 to Connolly & Co., in connection with the Kingston graving dock, passed, and the House adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

To Oppose Toronto and Hamilton Railway Bill.

The session of the Board of Control yesterday was very short. The recommendation of the Property Committee regarding the acceptance of Aid, Foster's cheque for the construction of a tablet in memory of the Toronto soldiers who fell in South Africa was not approved. The controllers felt that the city was able to stand the expense of a monument and that it should be erected in Queen's Park or other public place. The board, however, endorsed the suggestion that the statue now adorning the City Hall corridor should be removed to some other place.

The Assessment Commission will probably place it in one of the buildings on the Exhibition grounds. An account of \$10, for a clock in the office of the secretary of the Public School Board, was referred back, as it should be paid from the school funds.

The Toronto Ferry Company asked for \$804 for the repairs of the steamer that conveyed the bathers to Fishermen's Island from George street. The City Engineer was requested to inquire why the charge was greater than that of the last year.

A number of changes were recommended by the Controller on Council in the agreement with the Grand Trunk Railway regarding the John-street crossing and the Esplanade paving on account of the decision of the Court of Appeal declaring the whole of the Esplanade a street. A clause was added which will ensure the payment by the company of its share of the cost of paving the entire street, and railway track having been laid on Front-street since the agreement was drafted, the terms were changed so as to cover the two existing tracks, or any that may be laid in place thereof in the future.

The offer of Edgar J. Jarvis to sell two strips of land in Rosedale for park purposes was referred to Commissioner Fleming for a report. The expenditure incurred in opposing the passage of the Toronto and Hamilton Railway bill at Ottawa, amounting to \$2848, was ordered paid.

The returns from the Toronto Railway Company of its September business show an immense increase in street car traffic in the city. The gross receipts for the month were \$237,000, or an increase of \$40,000 over September, 1902. The city's percentage out of this sum amounted to \$19,008.72, as compared with \$15,782.16 in 1902.

The Board of Control and the Public School Board will hold a conference in reference to the disposal of \$82,000 granted by the city for additional school sites. The civic authorities in return for the grant wish to have the grounds thrown open to the public in the evenings, but this proposition is opposed by Superintendent Bishop, who fears that disorderly characters will frequent the grounds and damage school property. A compromise will probably be arrived at by which the grounds will be closed at nine o'clock every night, which will avoid the danger of depredations being committed.

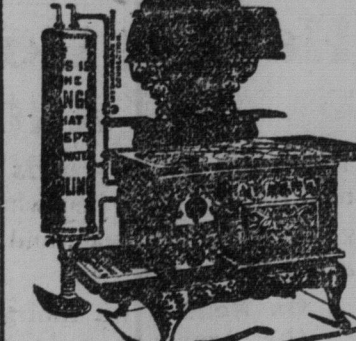
Bishop Young Retires.
