

FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENT

City Council Will Ask for Immediate Tenders for Certain Work—Public Meeting at Board of Trade Discuss Situation.

At the meeting of the City Council yesterday on the submission of the Works Committee's recommendation that the property owners be asked to vote on a by-law providing for the expenditure of a million dollars on the waterworks, Controller Spence asked for an explanation. The whole trouble was caused by the inexplicable blunder in laying the pipe across the Island.

The meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Rotunda, for the purpose of discussing the waterworks system was a fairly representative gathering. J. D. Allan presided and read letters of regret from Mayor Truquart and Goldwin Smith, who said:

The necessity of giving attention to the waterworks is evidently pressing, and is emphasized by the fire at Baltimore. All these things proclaim the difficulty of running a great city with a village organization, the intrinsic need of a suitable, skilled and immediately responsible administration. We have spent \$1.2 million on the new City Hall, while our waterworks are antiquated and we have no trunk sewer.

Would Consult Other Experts. The resolution passed at last Wednesday's special meeting of the Board of Trade Council was endorsed by a committee composed of members of representative bodies be appointed to consult with the Local Engineers' Association and to have a public meeting and it was necessary to make a report on the subject. The committee will therefore carry out the intent, to secure expert sources of information and engineer Rust's plan to reassess and enlist support of the taxpayers.

Chairman Foster explained the details of the Engineers' report, and asked if Council should accept the official recommendation or take that of Controller Spence. Engineer is Stated. Aid.
