Tough for Tupper

Another Stunning Defeat for the Conservative Commander.

Following His Abortive Attack on Major Walsh and the Yukon Management.

Brockville Wrested From the Grasp of the Opposition.

In Spite of the Gerry-mander and the Crack of the Party Whip.

W. H. Comstock (Liberal) Elected by 232 Majority Over Hon. Peter White (Conservative).

Brockville, April 21.—Yesterday was a red-letter day in the history of Liberalism in the good old riding of Brockville. The town went fairly wild with excitement over the return, by the handsome majority of 243, of Mr. W. H. Comstock, the candidate of the Liberal party. Both sides worked hard all day, and the weather was all that could be desired.

When the returns began to come in from the polling places in the town, showing large majorities for Mr. Comstock at nearly every point, the pent-up enthusiasm of the Liberals knew no bounds. By half-past 6 full returns had been received from the town, showing Mr. Comstock's majority to be 231. This assured his election by a large majority, for it was well known that the county could not give Mr. White over 180 at the most. It was some time before complete returns were received from the townships, but when they did come they were a surprise to even the most enthusiastic Liberal. The township of Elizabethtown, always a staunch Conservative stronghold, gave Mr. Comstock a majority of 35, and Kitley, which used to give Mr. Wood majorities ranging from 150 to 175, gave Mr. White only 123. This gave Mr. Comstock a clear majority of 243. At the general election in 1896 Hon. Mr. Wood's majority was 232. So it will be seen that there has been a regular landslide to the Liberal ranks.

THE NEW MEMBER'S OVATION. At 8 o'clock the supporters of Mr. Comstock formed a procession, and, headed by the Forty-First Battalion and Island City bands, proceeded to his residence. The victorious Liberal candidate was placed in a carriage, and the sturdy and willing younger members of the party drew him to the Opera House, amid the enthusiastic cheers of the crowd that thronged the streets. Arrived at the opera house, it was soon filled by the crowd, and Mr. Comstock, accompanied by Hon. Mr. Mulock, Messrs. O. E. Talbot, M.P., George P. Graham, M.P.P., James Cunningham, D. Derbyshire, O. K. Fraser, D. W. Downey and other leading Liberals, appeared on the stage. He was tendered such an ovation as has never been witnessed in Brockville. The crowd in the opera house cheered till they were hoarse, the bands played and the excitement was intense.

Speeches were made by the candidate and Messrs. O. K. Fraser, D. Derbyshire, D. W. Downey, James Cunningham, George P. Graham, M.P.P., and Hon. Mr. Mulock. They ascribed the victory to the record of the Laurier Administration, the personal worth and popularity of the candidate, the methods of the Tupperites, and the desire of the electors of Brockville to show in an unmistakable manner their resentment of the policy of slander and abuse that had been inaugurated by the opposition leaders. It was a complete vindication of the character and reputation of Mr. Walsh by the people who have known him all his life. Brockville has not returned a Liberal since 1874, and the return of the riding to the Reform ranks was a notable event.

Telegrams of congratulation were received from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir John A. Cartwright, W. S. Fielding, Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Hon. David Mills, Dr. Macdonald, M.P., Mr. F. T. Frost, M.P., Mr. Talbot, M.P., and many others.

Brockville, since confederation, has been Conservative, except from 1872 to 1878. The riding was gerrymandered in 1882. Since then the votes have been:

1882—W. H. Comstock (Lib.), 1,277; J. F. Wood (Con.), 1,281. Majority for Wood, 4.

1887—W. H. Comstock (Lib.), 1,534; J. F. Wood (Con.), 1,823. Majority for Wood, 289.

1891—D. Derbyshire (Lib.), 1,637; J. F. Wood (Con.), 1,815. Majority for Wood, 178.

On Dec. 21, 1892, Mr. Wood returned to his constituents after his appointment as controller of inland revenue, and was elected by acclamation.

1896—W. J. Cluff (Lib.), 1,448; James Cunningham (Lib.), 1,549; J. F. Wood, 1,781. Wood's majority over Cunningham, 232; majority over Cluff, 1,633.

FAVORABLE TO DREYFUS.

The Figaro devotes 24 columns to some 20 depositions of military officials, most of which are favorable to Dreyfus. It gives also a fac-simile of the bordereau. Major Forsinetti, who was director of the Cherche Midi military prison in 1894, at the time of the condemnation of Dreyfus, testified that Dreyfus consistently and persistently protested his innocence, and after he was condemned repeatedly asked for a revolver, declaring that his only crime was in having been born a Jew. The witness said that after the petition for a revision of the trial by court-martial was circulated, Col. Du Paty de Clam visited Dreyfus, and tried his utmost to draw from him a confession that he had been entrapped into a guilty communication of documents to a foreign power. Dreyfus energetically protested that he was not guilty, and Col. Du Paty de Clam said, in parting with him, "If you are a martyr of the century," Major Forsinetti, told the court that he questioned Capt. Lebrun-Renaud regarding the alleged confessions of Dreyfus, but Capt. Lebrun-Renaud promptly denied that Dreyfus had confessed anything.

AN ANGRY MEMBER.

There was a curious scene in the House of Commons yesterday. Mr. James M. MacLean (Conservative), who was editor and proprietor of the Bombay Gazette, and antagonistic to the India countervailing duties on sugar, commenced questioning the secretary of the state for India, Lord George Hamilton, in an irritating manner, for which he was frequently rebuffed by the ministerialists and by the speaker. Finally, turning angrily to the ministerial benches, Mr. MacLean shouted: "If the Unionists do not want me, I can join the opposition." Suited the action to the words, Mr. MacLean crossed over to the opposition benches, where he was greeted with a storm of Liberal applause, and ironical ministerial laughter. The angry member finally left the house.

STEEL AND IRON FAMINE.

Except in the memorable years 1873-74, there never has been a period when there was so general an outcry for steel and iron, at almost any price. Much of this is no doubt due to the development of colonial possessions in different parts of the world, but in Great Britain, the home demands have been greatly more than a normal average, owing to the large amount of work put in hand for naval requirements.

\$100,000,000 TO CHARITY.

Vienne, April 21.—The Neue Freie Presse asserts that the estate left by the late Baroness Maurice de Hirsch De Geruth, who died April 1, has been valued at \$125,000,000, of which \$100,000,000 will be expended in carrying out the various charities founded or fostered by the baron and baroness. The Hirsch fund in New York received \$1,200,000, and the institute in Montreal one-tenth of that amount.
