Brockville Wrested From the Grasp of the Opposition,

In Spite of the Gerrymander and the Crack of the Party Whip.

W. H. Comstock (Liberal) Elected by 232 Majority Over Hon. Peter White (Conservative).

Brockville, April 21.-Yesterday was red-letter day in the history of Liberalism in the good old riding of Brockville. The town went fairly wild with excitement over the return, by the handsome majority of 243, of Mr. W. H. Comstock, the candidate of the Liberal party. Both sides worked hard all day, and the weather was all that could

When the returns began to come in from the polling places in the town, showing large majorities for Mr. Comstock at nearly every point, the pent-up enthusiasm of the Liberals knew no bounds. By half-past 6 full returns had been received from the town, showing Mr. Comstock's majority to be 331. This assured his election by a large majority, for it was well known that the county could not give Mr. White over 180 at the most. It was some time before complete returns were received from the townships, but when they did come they were a surprise to even the most enthusiastic Liberal. The township of Elizabethtown, always a staunch been: Conservative stronghold, gave Mr. Comstock a majority of 35, and Kitley, which used to give Mr. Wood majorities ranging from 150 to 175, gave Mr. White only 123. # THE PARISIANS

Froude Says the Plague Has Appeared in the Gay Capital,

But Police Authorities Deny the Statement.

More Interesting Testimony in the Dreyfus Case.

#### Talk of a Steel and Iron Famine-German Army Officer Charged With Ligh Treason.

Paris, April 21.—The Froude gives a rumor that three cases of the plague one of the big shops of the city, to which the disease was brought in car-

pets of Eastern manufacture. The paper demands that a severe investigation into the matter be made. The police officials announce that there is utterly no foundation for the report, circulated by the Froude. "OH, LE MONSTRE!"

The Figaro, continuing its publication of the testimony in the Dreyfus revision proceedings before the court of cassation, prints the evidence of M. Bertillon, the handwriting expert, who gave the reasons which lead him to consider that the bordereau was forged by tracing the words, and pointed out details in the writing that were common to the bordereau and to the handwriting of Madame Dreyfus and also to that of the brother of the prisoner. Several words were showed to be exactly identical. M. Bertillon also explained the points which led him to regard Dreyfus as the author of the bordereau. When Bertillon was testifying before the court martial, Dreyfus exclaimed:

'Oh, le monstre, tu mas donc l'ecrire' -"Oh, the monster, thus thou sawest me write it!" After this exclamation Dreyfus ceased to follow the testimony. MM. Toysonnire and Charavay, the experts, testified to the similarity of the writing of the bordereau and that of Commandant Esterhazy, while M. Pollotera, and expert, energetically insisted that the writing was not that of

Drevfus.

pressed his opinion that the handwriting was that of Esterhazy.

FAVORABLE TO DREYFUS.

The Figaro devotes 24 columns to some 20 depositions of minor officials, most of which are favorable to Dreyfus. It gives also a fac-simile of the bordereau. Major Forsinetti, who was director of the Cherche Midi military prison in 1894, at the time of the con-demnation of Dreyfus, testified that Dreyfus consistently and persistently protested his innocence, and after he was condemned repeatedly asked for a revolver, declaring that his only crime was in having been born a Jew. The witness said that after the petition for a revision of the trial by court-martial was circulated, Col. Du Paty de Clam visited Dreyfus, and tried his utmost to draw from him a confession that he had been entrapped est martyr of the century." Major Forsinetti. told the court that he questhe alleged confessions of Dreyfus, but Capt. Lebrun-Renaud promptly denied that Dreyfus had confessed anything.

AN ANGRY MEMBER. There was a curious scene in the House of Commons yesterday. Mr. James M. MacLean (Conservative), who was editor and proprietor of the Bombay Gazette, and antagonistic to the India countervailing duties on sugar, commenced questioning the secretary of the state for India, Lord George Hamilton, in an irritating manner, for which he was frequently called to order by the ministerialists and by the speaker. Finally, turning angrily to the ministerial benches, Mr. MacLean shouted: "If the Unionists do not want me, I can join the opposition." Suiting the action to the words, Mr. MacLean crossed over to the opposition benches, where he was greeted with a storm of Liberal applause, and ironical ministerial laughter. The angry member finally left the house.

STEEL AND IRON FAMINE. Except in the memorable years 1873-74, there never has been a period when there was so general an outery for steel and iron, at almost any price. Much of this is no doubt due to the development of colonial possessions in different parts of the world, but in Great Britain, the home demands have been greatly more than a normal average, owing to the large amount of work put in hand for naval requirements.

\$100,000,000 TO CHARITY. Vienna, April 21.—The Neue Freie Presse asserts that the estate left by the late Baroness Maurice De Hirsch De Geruth, who died April 1, has been valued at \$125,000,000, of which \$100,-000,000 will be expended in carrying on the various charities founded or fos-tered by the baron and baroness. The Hirsch fund in New York received \$1,200,000, and the institute in Montreal one-tenth of that amount.

CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON. Albrecht, of the 129th regiment, has been arrested at Bromberg, Prussia, and has been taken in chains to Spandau. The prisoner is charged with high treason, in furnishing Russian agents with detailed plans of German fortifications and plans for mobilizing the German army.

MR. CHOATE TALKS. London, April 21.—At the anniversary dinner of the literary fund last evening, Sir George Otto Trevelyan,

nephew of Lord Macaulay, the celebrated historian, presided. In the course of a happy reference to the presence of Mr. Joseph H. Choate, the United States ambassador, he said that America had always sent distinguished representatives to Great Britain, and he reminded the com-pany that Benjamin Franklin presided at the first dinner of the society. Mr. Choate, responding for "Literature," emphasize the "harmonizing and unifying power of good literature between all peoples speaking the same lan-guage." While the Anglo-American literary tie, he continued, had never been broken and never could be, Ambeen broken and never could be, America had sent England an author whose name had entered every home in the kingdom. He referred not to Mark Twain nor to Mr. Dooley, but to Capt. Mahan, who had taught England more than she knew of her powers. In view of the debt due literary er. # STARTLING STORY

Captain of a German Warship Arrested by a British Commander.

Dominion Syndicate, Limited, Formed in London-Other Canadian Interests Promoted.

London, April 21.—The Dominion Syndicate (Limited), with a capital of £500,000, to build the Georgian Bay Canal within three years, has been formed here, and will develop the electrical, mineral, pulp and other industries along the route.
