The Canadian Pacific leads in mileage in operation, with a total of 9.306, the Canadian Northern comes next with 3,946, and the Grand Trunk follows with 3,708 miles. The total train mileage of all lines is 72,-

Several measures of significance and value have been placed on the statute books. Prominent among these are an act establishing a court of criminal appeal, a pure food act, an army reorganization act, an act establishing small holdings in England, an act legalizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister, which removes from the - political arena what for half a century or more has been a vexed question, and an act for the relief of evicted tenants in Ireland, the adoption by the Government of the Lords' amendments to which has caused the breaking of for a full one. the alliance which for over twenty years had existed between the Liberal and Irish Nationalist parties.

Some of the important bills that were announced in the speech from the throne could not, owing to pressure of other business and lack of time, even be introduced, and two very important measures, the Irish administrative councils bill and the Scotch small hold-Ings bill were withdrawn. The aim of the Government in the first-named and I can assure you it did not in any measure was to give to Ireland an installment of the home rule for which Its representatives at Westminster have for many years fought. The Min-Istry would fain have gone farther towards meeting Nationalist aspirations. but it had to consider the House of Lords. The object of the Government was to so frame the measures as to make it of real value and at the same time leave no possible excuse for its mutilation by the upper chamber. The Introduction of the bill was followed by its rejection by the Nationalists themselves as inadequate, and there was nothing left the Government but to withdraw it.

Perhaps the most important feature of the session was the opening of the campaign against the House of Lords. The House of Commons, by an overwhelming majority, has pronounced in favor of curtailing the power of the upper chamber to block the legislation of the people's representatives. The reform of the House of Lords will henceforth be in the forefront of the Liberal programme and will be a rallying cry for all the forces of democracy.

The operation of cremation requires about an hour and a half; the ashes are perfectly white and weigh four pounds, and the cost is about \$25. Cremation is now fully recognized by law in Great
