#### ONTARIO BUTTER FOR ENGLAND. Creameries Men Wait Upon the Minis ter of Agriculture-Want the

Old System Re-established

-The British Market.

The amalgamation of the creamery and cheese associations of the province has been in force now for a year, and while the cheese men are satisfied with the working of the combined association, the creamery men are not a unit. in favor of the arrangement. Last week Hon. Mr. Dryden was waited upon by a deputation at Toronto, composed of Messrs. John H. Croil, Aultsville, A. Wenger, Ayton, and R. J. Graham, Belleville. Their object was to ask for a renewal of the grant to the creameries association - in other words that the old system be re-estabdished. In addition to this they pre-sented a request for further assistance Bohemian Toast-Beat two eggs well, to England. They claimed that proper attention was not paid to the butther

ter industry of the province under present arrangement. The furdevelopment of the cheese industry they held would result in the reduction of the price below a paying basis while the British market for creamery butter would be practically unlimited were the industry once established; in addition there would be solve salt and soda in one-fourth cup a very large market for stock and hogs, which could be raised in connection

> With regard to the shipment of butregular weekly shipments of the finest fresh creamery butter of Ontario to Britain, as at first the existing prejudice against Canadian butter would have to be overcome. It is absurd, the deputation contended, to spend large sums of money upon the establishment of a cold storage system, and to neglect to secure the goods to make use of this system. The suggestion was thrown out that the creamery men should secure the consent of the farmers, so as to arrange for regular weekly shipments, to be said on arrival in Britain for the best price obtainable, the government paying the freight until the business is established. In this connection the interesting remark was made that the new cold storage system has proved of greater benefit to Americans than to any others, they

Hon. Mr. Dryden expressed himself as reluctant to change the present sistem. The deputation accordingly witadrew, and at a subsequent meeting it was decided to abandon the idea of holding an annual convention, and to arrange for a meeting of the creamery men at an early date for the purpose of trying to arrange for a re-gular supply of fresh butter to be sent every week. These shipments can hardly be expected to bring their actual value at first, and the position farmers who agree to furnish the butter for these shipments should not be expected to stand all the loss which


