In the Dining-Room.

THURSDAY, JAN. 13.

BREAKFAST—Egg fried, ham, toast, Cornmeal pancakes, Maple syrup, Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Scalloped oysters, Graham bread, Coconut flakes, Crushed currants, Crust coffee.

DINNER—Stuffed veal ribs, Baked potatoes, Egg and butter, English apple pie, Cheese, Tea.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Cornmeal Pancakes—Beat two eggs well, add one-half cup milk, one-fourth teaspoon salt, a sprinkle of pepper, one teaspoonful onion juice. In this mixture dip bread (state may be used) until soft, then fry in well-greased skillet until a side brown on both sides.

Cornmeal Flakes—One-half cup of butter beaten light with one cup of sugar. Two well-beaten eggs and one-fourth cup of milk. Stir in one cup of grated coconut, one teaspoon of lemon juice and one teaspoon of baking powder sifted in flour, and flour enough to roll. Mix smooth, roll quite thin, cut and bake quickly.

Crust Coffee—Brown Boston brown bread until quite hard, crush with rolling-pin; place one-half cupful in coffee pot; pour over one pint of boiling water; boil five minutes; add one pint of milk; let heat; add one tablespoon of sugar; let settle two or three minutes and pour.

English Apple Pie—Slice apples very thin and fill a deep dish evenly. Add one-fourth cup of water, two-thirds cup of sugar, bits of butter, a sprinkle of salt and a grating of lemon. Cover top with good puff paste, being sure to wet the edges of dish. It is nice eaten warm with cream and sugar.

Presbytery of London

The 250th Anniversary of the Westminster Standards to be Celebrated.

A Busy Session of the Presbytery at Glencoe.

Chalmers Church to Assume Its Own Mortgage—A Rearrangement of Fields.

The Presbytery of London met in the church at Glencoe at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Rev. J. G. Stuart, of London, presiding.

The first item of business was a communication from the secretary of the W. F. M. S. auxiliary of London Presbytery asking that Mr. Drummond, of St. Thomas, be appointed to represent the presbytery at their annual meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 1, in Glencoe. It was decided that the understanding that if he should find it impossible to fill the appointment, the moderator should have power to arrange with the ladies for another representative.

A communication was read from Dr. Robertson in regard to home mission work, which very strongly urged the necessary expansion of work in the West, and stated that it would be calamitous if the church failed at this juncture. He asked that the presbytery should discuss this matter and pass a resolution in regard to it.

Mr. John Currie moved that the communication be received, and the letter from Dr. Robertson referred to the presbytery home missions committee to prepare a resolution on the matter. Carried.

The cost of printing model constitutions for Young People's Societies was ordered to be paid.

The treasurer of the presbytery, absent through illness, sent an abstract statement as follows:

Balance from 1898 \$231.12
Received from congregations 294.45
Borrowed on note 200.00

Total \$725.57

Expenses of synod and presbytery \$231.38

Assembly expenses 106.55

Total \$568.91

leaving a balance of \$156.66; a net deficit of \$162.16.

The report was received, laid on the table, and Messrs. T. Wilson and A. S. Macgregor, of London, were appointed auditors to report at the March meeting.

R. Johnson, convener of committee on assembly remits, not being prepared with his report, it was left for the March meeting.

It was decided that the conference for May be held in Knox Church, St. Thomas, on the Monday afternoon and evening preceding the May meeting of the presbytery, the programme therefore to be arranged by R. W. Ross, convener of Young People's Societies in the presbytery, Mr. John Currie to be associated with Mr. Ross in this work.

Mr. John Currie moved that there be a celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Westminster standards on the evening of the May meeting of the presbytery, the details to be prepared by a committee.

It was moved in amendment that every congregation be recommended to hold a celebration at such time and place as they may see fit, suggesting March 12 as an appropriate date.

The session records of Appin and Tait's Corners were certified as carefully and correctly kept, also records of North Edinburgh and Dutton.

Mr. Moffatt, on behalf of Chalmers Church, requested that the congregation be authorized by presbytery to assume the mortgage at present held for them by the First Church. On motion the request was granted.

Mr. Currie presented a report of the committee on proposed rearrangement of fields, as follows: That the presbytery unite Tempo and Alma Street, St. Thomas, and South Delaware with North Delaware and South Caradoc; such a rearrangement would result in a saving of some \$300 to the augmentation fund.

After a lengthy discussion was held on the report and other possible rearrangements suggested, such as:

South Delaware, Tempo and South Westminster.

It was moved by W. J. Clark, seconded by R. Johnston, that a committee consisting of the moderator, Messrs. Drummond and T. Wilson, and A. S. Macgregor, elder, visit the congregations of South Delaware, Tempo, South Westminster and North Westminster, and obtain all information regarding the possibility of uniting South Delaware, Tempo and South Westminster, leaving North Westminster standing alone, and report to presbytery.

The matter of supply for South Delaware and Tempo was left in the hands of Messrs. Drummond and Henderson. It was decided that if any further aid be needed for South Delaware and Tempo, the committee on schemes of the church, which was before the conference on Tuesday night, and which is given in the report of the conference.

The report was received, and its items considered separately and passed, with the amendment that while one or two schemes be on the docket of every regular meeting of presbytery, there shall be no special allotment of time.

Mr. Henderson moved: When the presbytery adjourns it adjourns till the 15th day of February next, then to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the induction of Rev. W. R. Sutherland, the meeting to be at 11 a.m. at Glencoe, the details to be left to a committee consisting of Mr. Henderson (convener) and the ministers and elders of the congregations to which Mr. Sutherland has ministered.

Mr. Moffatt presented the report of Monday night's conference, and its recommendation was adopted.

Mr. Currie presented the following names as members of the standing committee on schemes of the church: A. Henderson, home missions; J. Currie, augmentation; R. Johnston, foreign missions; D. R. Drummond, French evangelization; W. J. Clark, colleges; Mr. Rathburn, Glencoe, aged and infirm ministers' fund; A. Thomson, assembly fund; A. Henderson to act as convener.

The next regular meeting of the presbytery is to be held in the First Church, London, on the second Tuesday in March, at 10:30 a.m.

The ladies of the church furnished a very plentiful refreshment in the school room for the members of the court, for which hearty thanks were expressed by the members of the presbytery.

THE McALL MISSION.

Addresses by Mesdames Cowan and Owen—A Good Year's Work by the London Church.

A fair-sized audience assembled in the First Presbyterian Church Monday evening to listen to the story of work among the French as presented by Mesdames Cowan and Owen, of Toronto.

The reasons for sending help to France were dwelt upon by Mrs. Cowan, who is the president of the Canadian Association. She showed how the McAll mission had developed under God's wonderful leading from humble beginnings, Paris and many provinces, and how it was being leavened with gospel influence.

Mrs. Owen, having spent a year in close association with McAll, spoke feelingly of her delight. McAll, she said, was a man of great faith and work which had been principally in the year closing last April and May. In such a short time, she said, many incidents showed the self-sacrificing spirit of the working class who frequent the halls.

Mrs. F. E. Leonard, secretary, read the report of the London Auxiliary. It was a record of quiet, faithful work among the members. The income for the year closing last April amounted to \$50.50, and the treasurer has now on hand about \$100 ready to send to Toronto for the year 1900.

Rev. Ira Smith, in the absence of the pastor, presided with his usual kindly spirit, speaking many encouraging words of the work done and to be done in France.

Miss Frier rendered two solos very sweetly, being joined by the choir in the chorus part of "Consider the Lilies."

So much interest was taken in the speakers that it was decided to hold a special meeting on Thursday afternoon at the residence of the president, 363 King street, when Mrs. Cowan and Mrs. Owen will address the ladies in the work, and the election of officers for 1898 will take place.
