

FORWARD MOVE

Head of Huron Diocese Delivers Annual Charge to Synod.

Recommendations of 1919, charge of Bishop of Huron:

Bishop's Recommendations 1. (a) That the sum of \$2,000 be added to the capital of the widows' and orphans' fund, to bring it up (b) That the synod consider the advisability of including in the budget an annual sum to be added

to the capital, which should at least 2. (a) That the synod refer the whole matter of increase of pensions to the executive committee for complete report and recommenda-

tions to the next synod.

(b) That the grants to clergy in purely Indian missions be increased from \$600 to \$800, the balance of the stipend to be made up by Indian congregations, an addition of \$400 a year.
3. That the synod through the

executive committee apply to the augmentation of the commutation fund capital such an amount as may be deemed advisable from the 10 per cent held back according to statute, and afterwards by vote transferred to the mission fund.
4. (a) That a fund be created to cover traveling expenses of the executive committee, by levying a rate upon the parishes similar to the rate now levied for the equaliza-

tion of railway fares to synod. (b) That the rate be made sufficient to cover traveling expenses to regular meetings of the provincial syrod and of the departmental boards of the general synod. Reason for these recommenda-tions: Increase in railway rates, which results in breakdown of representative system because delegates cannot afford to attend owing to

expenses.

5. That the executive committee be reduced to 40 or 30 members, instead of 60; also that the representation of each diocese on the depart-mental boards of the general synod might be reduced from four to two epresentatives, traveling expenses having a bearing also upon this recommendation.

Gratitude to God for freedom from the uncertainty, stress and perils of war, and the triumph of right over might, was the kevnote of the masterly charge of the Bishop of Huron, delivered Tuesday afternoon at the opening of the 62nd session of the synod of the Diocese of Huron. In gratitude to God for the cessation of hostilities and the signing of the armistice on November II, the great "forward movement" of the Church of England in Canada had its origin. A large part of Bishop Williams' address was devoted to explana

statesmanlike recommendations were made in regard to the creating of special funds to safeguard the future. Emphasis was laid upon the statement that even as the church fulfilled a vital function in the great war, because it adhered to its prophetic and inspirational function of keeping high and lifted up the moral ideals contended for in the war, so the church can best fulfill a vital function in the midst of reconstruction problems and industrial unrest by proclaiming the righteousness and the love of God, and by exhibiting these in its own life.

Lessons of Unity.

"We must guard now." he said, "against losing the prophetic and inspirational function, and becoming immersed in the championship of a class, or in any project or policy, merely because it promises quick returns and popularity."

The amount required to make the machinery of the church effective is \$1,010,000, three-quarters of a million required for pensions alone, and the remainder for other purposes.

The grand objective of the Anglican forward movement, including the church's share in evangelization of the world is \$2,500,000.

There is to be only one appeal, the appeal of the forward movement in connection with the General Synod.
There is to be one form of contribution only to be used by canvassers, the form supplied by the executive committee of the A. F. M.

"4—All contributions without exception are to be sent in to the treasurer with the forward movement were em-

"4—All contributions without exception are to be sent in to the treasurer of the A. F. M. appeal fund.
"5—The treasurer of the A. F. M. appeal fund will remit in due course to each diocesan treasurer the amount due to each diocese as its share in the total sum available for diocesan local needs."








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
