Another One Needed to Clean Streets of City.

The purchase of another flusher motor truck to be used in cleaning the city streets next year with the one flusher now in use was the most important matter considered last evening by No. 2 committee of the city council, which met in the city hall at 7 o'clock. It was finally desided that the matter be referred to the next meeting of the council with the recommendation, in case the council decides to purchase a new flusher, that either a Tiffin motor flusher or a National flusher with the Studebaker attachment be ordered. This motion was advanced by Ald. E. Seabrook; it included a statement of the probable cost of each flusher, the Tiffin price being \$9,980, and the National being \$10,875, and also the recommendation of City Engineer Brazier that the

Tiffin truck be purchased.

The necessity of purchasing another flusher was recognized, for although the present flusher is satisfactory in every respect, it was believed that a second truck would be needed next year by the street cleaning department, especially if the large pavement program of the council is put into effect in 1920. I think that the city should have two street flushe s," said Ald. G. B. Drake. "If all of the pavements are not cleaned during the sammer season the people will complain about the dust." "Democracy is sweeping the world like a tidal wave, not only where governments are concerned but in the industrial world. We find it demanded and granted, too, at a rate that is dustrial world. We find it demanded and granted, too, at a rate that is alarming. But a man who has studied a dozen governments' reports that those in which the people had the least to do and say were best." said Professor E. G. Conklin, giving his second Western University extension lecture on "Democracy and Evolution" in St. Andrew's Hall yesterday afternoon. "What is democracy? Many people talk about democracy without knowing the true definition. Democracy is the control of all things of common interest by the people as a whole rather than control by an individual or a class. Democracy should stand for liberty, fratern'ty and equality. The demand for freedom, for democracy is a great evolutionary struggle. Everyone is wanting individual freedom.






