Toronto Consumers To Pay **Less During Summer** Months.

"Haven't heard about it." was the reply of London retail milk dealers when asked today if there would be any reduction in the price of milk in London for the summer months, as is being made in Torento and other cities. The milk condenseries, which set the wholesale price of milk in Western Ontario, have reduced the price paid to the farmer from \$3.10 to \$2.75 per hundredweight.

Similar wholesale reduction in other districts have been followed by slight reductions in the retail price. Toronto consumers, where the wholesale price is \$2.60 per eight-gallon can, will during May, June, July and August, get 14 pints of milk for \$1, instead of 13 pints, as at present. Apparently there is to be no reduction in the local retail prices.



General satisfaction was felt by all local civil service employees as a result of the announcement from Ottawa that a bill to amend the civil sertawa that a bill to amend the civil service act has been introduced into the House by Hon. N. W. Rowell. The bill provides that the re-classification of the civil service shall go into effect from April 1, 1919, instead of April 1, 1920, as provided in the act last session. The move was not unexpected by the local men as a promise to this effect. The move was taken as a result of agitations on the part of the different associations of civil service men hroughout the country, who claimed that because of low wages many of the men were forced to suffer hardships during the past year.


