"Most of the money invested in Canada comes from England. The money

The English capitalists have responded nobly to our wants, but the American has not. There is out little American capital invested here, but over 74 per cent of our loans are held.

English capital is essential to the development of the resources of Canada, and we must be careful that we treat the investments of our foreign capital decently.
