PUPILS' HEALTH GOOD.

The report of the medical officer of the board of education for the month of March shows that the number of children examined in classrooms was 29,263, and the number of inspections 5339. The total number of defects found was 2263, and those with disease 756. Four hundred and seventynine were excluded for contagious diseases, and the number of suspects was 49. The number of children who received complete dental treatment was 927, and 283 additional children relieved of toothache only. Nearly 8000 operations were performed and 727 extractions were made at Orde street clinic. The eye clinic ordered 79 pairs of glasses. At the ear, nose and throat clinic 204 cases were dealt with, and 101 operations performed. At the chest clinic 136 cases were attended to, including 42 new cases.
